#### Choice Made

Once again it seems I have come across evidence that there were several possibilities before production began on a particular Royal Bayreuth piece, this time the devil and cards creamer. Since my discovery of the alternate covered sugars last year I have been sensitive to the fact that these preliminary considerations are out there. As I look for devil and card pieces offered on eBay and other sites I look more closely, trying to detect subtle differences in form. One of these, I believe, is present here. Marked only with an incised number, this may be another of the 'test" molds. The most striking difference is that the spout of the creamer is made by the two outer cards whereas on the familiar form it is made with those behind the two outer cards. Another difference is the devil's tail, seen here on the left, normally to the right. Other small dissimilarities are shown in the provided photos.

Beyond the serendipitous grace and whimsy and the quality exceeding purpose, it is this constant opportunity for discovery. This is partly due to the apparent laxity of the operation early on (and of course the fires). This makes an ever-present pleasure for me in the collecting of this compelling porcelain. Good hunting to all!

#### Website News

Be sure to view the 2012 auction list, updated until convention, available on the home page of the website. The convention form is also available there if you prefer to use that instead of the one included in the newsletter.

There have been a few cases where users have been locked out of our website. This is a security feature of our website host that we benefit from and cannot change. If you enter an incorrect password several times your "IP" address may be locked out of the website. Your "IP" address is a unique identifier that shows your connection to the internet. If our host sees multiple attempts to access a website from the same IP using an incorrect password it thinks you are trying to break in and will block you. If that happens you will need to identify your IP address (for example visit www. whatismyip.com) and send it to editor@royalbayreuth.org. We must then refer it to the security person at our host who will unlock your IP so you can again access the site. It may be troublesome, but that is one of the ways to keep our site safe. Be sure to use the latest password!

#### Potential Fraud Alert

To all vintage porcelain collectors: I have found what I believe to be the major source of modern reproductions of antique porcelain collectables. This includes half-dolls, bathing beauties, creamers and other figurines, particularly those of Schafer & Vater. This is a follow-up to an article published last year where in I presented several suspect eBay sellers offering reproductions rarely identified and left to the assumptions of the unwary collector. As you will see this company is based in Belgium and may or may not be directly involved in the eBay sold pieces. 
