

This is no accident, but, is due to the efforts of our out-going officers and members that have really put forth the interest it takes. We have a challenge to continue the things that have worked for them. I am very pleased with your selection of the New Officers and Board. We would like to request your input concerning the Newsletter, the Auction, the Hospitality Room. future convention sites after '2001'. The year 2000 will be at the Marriott in Indianapolis, Indiana. Phone # is 317-352-1231.

There are three things that it takes to insure a good convention: (1) a good Hospitality Room; (2) a good auction; and (3) a nice hotel with good facilities. Our members worked very hard to insure the

first and second. This year, the hotel's failure to keep us on the 1st and 2nd floors, made the closeness we should have felt, less evident by our being scattered through 7 floors. I apologize for this inconvenience. We will try hard to prevent this in the future.

The nominating committee chairman for 2000 is Bob Serving with him is Gollmar. Karen Church and Mary Anderson. There are 3 directors to be elected. All three present directors are eligible for reelection for their 2nd term of 2 They are Harriet Land, vears. Judy Stockwell, and Debra Tuttle. Paul Toland has agreed to chair our 2000 auction. He needs good Royal Bayreuth items. The 1999 auction had 169 items, of

which, 49 of them were 'no sales'. The gross sales were The \$116,800. **RBCC** commission was \$4,726.40. Get in line early if you are interested in putting something in. members get breaks that cannot be offered by private auction houses. Look at this years record prices. We all say "good job, Paul and Colleen"!! I would appreciate your suggestions concerning the auctions for the up-coming years. The officers and directors hope to put on an auction that is interesting for all convention goers. An auction that has a good assortment of pieces in all price ranges, for the beginners as well as the long-time collector that are still hunting for a certain piece. The 1999 auction's top 10 items totaled \$75,550.00. This left 107 items that totaled \$40,630.00. RBCC received \$1,500.00 from the top 10 selling pieces, or about 2%. RBCC received about \$3,250.00

from the 107 other items. It is evident that both ranges are needed for RBCC's 2000 auction. If we have no new members coming to our conventions, our future would not be very bright, excuse my rambling, just "keep up the good work".

BOARD OF DIRECTORS MEETING Sept. 30, 1999 @ 3:00 p.m.

President Tim Gaudet opened the 1999 Board of Directors meeting by asking Judy White, Membership Secretary, to read the minutes from the last Board meeting on 10/10/98. Minutes were informally accepted by the board, Treasurer Jack Biddlecome gave a club accounting as follows: Special Auction Account: \$3,804.69; Balance as of 8/30/99; \$8,686.65; Balance as of 9/30/99: \$9,779.25. Jack indicated that were outstanding bills, and that last year's carry-over (from 10/30/98) was approximately \$4,861.00. A discussion ensued concerning the President's approval of expenditures.

Harriet Land reported on the slate of officers for the 1999-2000 year. Each of these offices carries a two-year term:

Vice President Bob Gollmar

Treasurer Sandy Heerhold
Directors at large:
Bev Brumbaugh; Alvin Cappel;

Joeleen Passow.

Additional nominations will be accepted at the general business meeting. The Newsletter editor is appointed by the new president. The outgoing president appoints a recording secretary. Bob McCaslin moved and Judy White seconded to approve the slate of officers. Board

approve the slate of officers. Board members unanimously approved the motion.

A discussion followed as to voting procedures at the general election, show of hands or paper ballots. The RBCCI Constitution provides for a secret ballot if called for at the general business meeting. It was decided that Tim Gaudet will ask for additional nominations, and Bob Gollmar will provide paper ballots, if necessary.

Auction Chairman Paul Toland stated that there were 166 pieces of Royal Bayreuth in the auction. If reserves are met, the gross proceeds should total around \$90,000. There were 4 lots of absentee bids. Roland Rosenboom will he the auctioneer, and he will announce all items as mint except where damage has been noted by a red dot on the piece. Bob McCaslin will handle all absentee bids. Tim Gaudet will handle all reserve bids. Paul Toland reported 9 new membership resulting from the Antique Week auction ads. piece of RB was accepted by a nonmember because of its extreme rarity. Judy White went on record as being opposed to allowing any item in the auction unless the owner was a member of the RBCCI. Tim Gaudet pointed out that we may need to give our auction chairman the flexibility to use his own judgment in procuring pieces for the auction. discussion followed as to whether policy governing submission of auction items needs to be changed or modified. Harriet Land made a motion. seconded by Judy Stockwell, to

postpone any further discussion until the next board meeting.

White Judy gave membership report. There are now 181 family memberships, an increase of 25 just since July 12, 1999. Recognition will be given at the general meeting to those members who elicited this increase. Tim Gaudet will ask new members to stand, introduce themselves, and briefly describe their RB specialties. Harriet Land asked if email addresses could be included in the next membership directory. It was decided that all members will be asked to write their email addresses on a slip of paper at the next business meeting and give to Alma Biddlecome for inclusion in the directory.

Judy Stockwell gave an advertising report. Of the 88 announcements submitted, 30 were printed in various antique journals newspapers and absolutely free of charge. Judy White reported that she has received a request from THE COLLECTOR to submit articles about Royal Bayreuth and the Harriet Land also RBCCI. indicated that she received a similar request from ANTIQUE WEEK.

Under auction business, Paul Toland reported that he received several complaints about the \$10.00 fee for items in the auction that do not sell because they do not meet the owner's reserve. He asked if the directors wanted to

consider rescinding that policy. Debra Tuttle felt that the \$10.00 covered the handling expense before, during, and after the auction. A discussion followed, and board members felt that this should be brought before the general membership to grant input. Paul Toland also stated that according to the Club's auction guidelines, members should be aware that the Club does not carry insurance on auction items. Paul felt that a disclaimer should be added to the consignment form that sellers fill out when submitting auction items. Paul also expressed concern about the possibility of bad checks as the auction gains in popularity and as better and more costly items are sold. A machine used by some auction houses to validate checks would cost the club 3% of the gross proceeds. A discussion followed, and board members felt that this figure was too high.

Bob Gollmar brought up Article 3, Subsection (a) of the Constitution for discussion. This subsection states that members of the RBCCI can overrule any decision made by the Board of Directors. Bob felt that this section should be amended to exclude the location of any future convention site. No decision was made to amend this subsection.

Tim Gaudet will inform the membership about the stand that many of the hotels in the Embassy Suites chain have taken to demand \$5,000 up front for meeting rooms, hospitality rooms, etc. In addition,

hotels in other chains are booked up to 3 years in advance. It was felt that RBCCI should look at a 3-year horizon when booking convention sites. Bob McCaslin informed the board that the Columbus Marriott broke several provisions in their contract when they separated members attending convention instead reserving a block of rooms on the first and second floors promised.

Bob Gollmar moved and Bob McCaslin seconded to keep family membership dues at \$30,00. A discussion followed. Jack Biddlecome mentioned that the Board may wish to consider raising dues for members not living in the U.S. due to the higher costs of mailing Newsletters. Board members voted to maintain the \$30.00 dues rate for all members. The motion passed unanimously.

Bob McCaslin gave a report on the Marriott convention site agreement. Comped rooms for the 1999 convention included the hospitality room, 2 sleeping rooms for the hospitality room co-hosts, the auction preview room, and one sleeping room for every 50 paid rooms. The current Board policy differs in that the ranking covers hospitality room, one hospitality chair sleeping room, President's room, additional comped rooms to be awarded as door prizes. The Club covers the auctioneer's stay. A

discussion followed. Judy White made a motion to establish a budget for convention entertainment of \$500 (maximum) beginning 1999. Debra Tuttle seconded. The motion passed with one abstention and one opposed.

A winter convention will again be held in California with hosts Colleen and Paul Toland. No date has been set, but it will probably be in late February, 2000. Paul also reported that he owns the domain name "www.royalbayreuth.com". Although Paul intends to maintain sole ownership of the domain name, he will, with prior email approval, allow any members to post messages, articles, photos, etc. on the site. Steve Bartlett and Tim Sullivan have volunteered to help with this website.

Tim Gaudet raised the question of moving the boundaries for the convention sites to include both the East and West coasts to accommodate more members. According to current policy, convention sites are limited to the Midwest area between St. Louis, MO and Harrisburg/Philadelphia, PA. Judy White will provide Tim with a geographic membership list and Tim will open this discussion to the general membership. The 2000 convention will be held at the Indianapolis Marriott with Becky Conrad chairing the hospitality room. Bob and Pat Madeiros will co-chair. The 2001

convention will be held at the Harrisburg Marriott with Richard Chubb chairing the hospitality room.

Bob Gollmar recommended that Board policy be amended to include 2 comped rooms for the hospitality chairpersons. Harriet Land motioned and Paul Toland seconded to change the word "chairperson" to chairpersons". The motion passed unanimously.

Tim asked Board members to pass along any additional ideas for questions for discussion in writing before the next board meeting. Bob McCaslin motioned to adjourn the meeting, Judy Stockwell seconded. The meeting was adjourned at 5:28 pm.

#### WELCOME MEETING OCTOBER 1, 1999 @ 9:00 A.M.

President Tim Gaudet welcomed all members of the RBCCI to the 1999 convention, and outlined the general format of the meeting. The first hour would be devoted to new business, and the second hour to a "Show and Tell" session.

Alma Biddlecome, Newsletter Editor, will be collecting email addresses from all members to add to the roster. A sheet will be posted in the hospitality room for "wanted" items. These items may include parts, pieces, lids, etc. that members are looking for and would like to purchase.

Tim reminded members that voting for the "World's Most Unusual" Royal Bayreuth will take place after the business meeting on Saturday. He then reviewed the Board of Directors meeting, highlighting the following:

- 1. An entertainment budget was established, maximum \$500.00.
- 2. Membership continues at \$30 per family; dues may be paid at the convention; there is no additional charge for new members who join after September 1; \$5 credit is deducted from the \$30 dues renewal for each new member recruited.
- 3. Proposed slate of officers:
  President Bob McCaslin;
  Vice President Bob Gollmar
  Secretary Mary McCaslin
  Treasurer Sandy Heerhold
  Directors Alvin Cappel; Joeleen
  Passow; and Bev Brumbaugh
- 4. Membership has increased dramatically due to aggressive advertising and word of mouth.
- 5. Rolly Rosenboom will be the

auctioneer for tonight's auction with 166 pieces listed.

6. Ann Heeley has been appointed Recording Secretary.

The membership was asked for input regarding the location of future convention sites. Members were made aware of the difficulties associated with moving frequently, the better deals offered to RBCCI for keeping the convention in one city two years in a row, the up-front fee required by some Embassy Suites, and the large membership required by some hotel chains. Members were encouraged to provide suggestions to any board member.

Tim asked how members felt about the current \$10 charge imposed on auction items that do not sell or do not meet their reserves. He indicated that although the club is non-profit, we do incur expenses on unsold items. Alternatives to the \$10 fee include a sliding scale fee, payment based on the number of unsold items as a percent of the total items, raising the \$10 fee as a percent of the reserve. Suggestions from members are needed.

Tim informed members about a Royal Bayreuth auction to be held north of Portland, Maine at the end of October. Brochures will be sent to members, and absentee bid forms can be picked up after the Welcome Meeting.

Nancy Rublaitus is collecting

photos and articles for the club scrapbooks. She has the scrapbooks in her room now, but will be moving them to the Hospitality Room. Tim thanked Nancy for the wonderful job she has done in maintaining the scrapbooks.

Souvenirs and items from past conventions will be on sale in the Hospitality Room. Extra membership applications are also available.

Becky Conrad encouraged members to post applications on their websites. She has an email application request on her website, and has received many responses.

The auction preview room will be open at 11:00 in the Capital Room, and lunch will be served in the Hospitality Room from 11:45 to 12:45.

Tim made a verbal request for three members to serve on the Audit Committee. Sandy Heerhold, Debra Tuttle, and Dottie Earle volunteered.

Tim opened the "Show and Tell" portion of the meeting. Here is what members brought to share:

Tim Gaudet - Rose Tapestry Pin Dish, like a saucer, but no indentation for the cup, Salt & Pepper Shakers, like red peppers, but with cucumber vine leaves.

Nancy Rublaitus - Poppy Cup and Saucer painted gold inside the cup and on the saucer.

Mary McCaslin - Cat Head Bank with Coin Slot, 2 inches tall, no opening on the bottom to remove money. Blue marked Creamer. Gray Opossum with Baby on her back, unmarked. Smiling Dachshund Creamer, front paw is raised, blue mark.

Wanda & Al Friedrich - Small Reddish-Orange Elephant Shaker or Stickpin, unmarked.

Terry Seggebruch - Creamer, white bisque Water Buffalo with dark paint on eyes only, faintly marked. Two Cards (no devil), resembles a wall plaque, very thick, blue marked. Two Tapestry Shoes, some sort of buildings on them, very small, green Tettau mark, may have been used as pin cushions. Miniature Cheese Dish with Fairy Lady, German mark on bottom. Lady with Bonnet (a Prussian Lady) on a mug with RB blue mark and on a bud vase, UM. Four handled small vase with a lady and child at a spinning wheel.

Jill McClurg - large pinch-spout tapestry water pitcher with gold writing on the side (illegible, but may be French or German), found in Canada.

David Burghoff - tiny perfume with sterling lid, tapestry courting couple, may be Goblin Chocolate Cup, blue marked with brown paint sprayed over most of the mark.

Paul Toland - Blue and white stein, lithographic scene on bottom when held up to the light, Tettau mark, also marked with "59" in blue.

Ricky Kupferer - hair receiver with deco lady marked Bayreuth, not Royal Bayreuth, also marked "Gloria's Fine Porcelain".

Terry Anderson - Tapestry ginger jar with insert, marked with old green T mark.

Nancy Owen - Pocket watch holder with horses, blue mark.

William Brooke - pansy tea strainer with matching rest in white opal, blue mark. Open master and small salts, man and turkeys. Pansy toothpick in pinkish-purple (brought especially for Paul Toland to see).

Richard Chubb - Clover creamer, blue mark.

Nancy Brandenburg - Footed pink egg, top is "cracked" to look like a real egg, three different children's Easter scenes around the outside, lots of gold.

Harold Brandenburg - Frog and bee mug with figural lizard handle, frog is smoking a cigar. Red elephant figurine.

Alvin Cappel - Lamp base with dog and hunter pushing a stick into a river bank, 18 inches tall.

Judy Stockwell - Water buffalo covered sugar and matching milk pitcher, blue marked. Triangular pin tray with 2 sides curled over, castle and cottage scene. Hat (like a straw skimmer hat) about 4" across. Crow salt and pepper. History book with an original letter on Tettau letterhead written by the man who did work on porcelain marks, book has color plates, book is written in German, but will be translated in English, photocopies will be made available to club members.

#### BUSINESS MEETING October 2, 1999 @ 9:50 a.m.

President Tim Gaudet welcomed members with a reminder to vote on the "World's Most Unusual" Royal Bayreuth pieces on display. He also reminded members to provide Alma Biddlecome with their email addresses. The "Want" list is still on display in the Hospitality Room. The agenda for today's meeting will focus on voting for new officers and directors, the convention auction, thank-you's, officers' and committee reports,

changes in club policy, and other new business.

One member questioned why items not sold during last night's auction were not bid with the number 21 and announced as stated prior to the auction. Tim explained that the absentee and reserve bidding procedures were changed just a few minutes before the auction began, and that some confusion resulted. He indicated that this would be discussed at the Board of Directors meeting later today. The description and number of unsold items were read aloud so that members could mark their auction list accordingly.

Chuck Heerhold and Craig Heeley were asked to tally votes for the "World's Most Unusual" Royal Bayreuth contest. It was also suggested that the "Most Unusual" and "Show and Tell" pieces be videotaped photographed next year. Tim reported that the Audit Committee had not yet completed their report. and that it would be made available to members via the Newsletter.

Judy White gave the Membership Secretary's report, stating that the club had grown from 33 family membership in Schaumburg five years ago to 183 family memberships as of today. She also recalled that her 1995 Secretary's report finished with a plea for donations from members to cover the club's anticipated debt.

Jack Biddlecome's Treasurer's report showed a balance of \$12,491.34 with several bills outstanding. He also gave an auction comparison: the 1995 auction grossed around \$6,000; the 1999 auction grossed \$112,290. Tim thanked Colleen and Paul Toland for their hard work in making this year's auction so successful.

Roberta Cappel gave a report on the Hospitality Room. She stated that the total amount spent on convention packets, door signs, name tags, food, and many other Hospitality Room goodies was actually less than the amount allocated by the Board. She asked that members recycle their name tags and wooden door signs by turning them in to the Hospitality Room for use at next year's convention.

Tim read the proposed slate of officers aloud. Three calls for additional nominations were made, but no names were added to the existing slate. Harriet Land made a motion, seconded by Paul Toland and Debra Tuttle, to accept the slate of officers as read. Paper ballots were rejected in favor of an oral vote, and the membership voted unanimously to accept the following officers:

President - Bob McCaslin
Vice President - Bob Gollmar
Secretary - Mary McCaslin
Treasurer - Sandy Heerhold
Directors at Large - Bev Brumbaugh
Alvin Cappel & Joeleen Passow.

The next item of business involved the location of future conventions. After much discussion, the general consensus favored keeping the current boundaries of convention sites: West to St. Louis, MO and East to Philadelphia, PA. The new Board, which meets tonight, will continue to accept suggestions from the general membership. It was noted that next year's convention will be October 11-14. 2000 Indianapolis.

Members discussed the \$10 fee for unsold auction items. Current Club policy calls for an 8% fee on items sold with a maximum charge of \$150. Fees generated flow into the Club treasury. A \$10 fee is assessed on any item that does not sell or meet the reserve. Both fees are used to help cover convention security. It was reported that 38% of the items in yesterday's auction were not sold.

Joyce and Jack William's reported that House & Garden TV will feature the William's collection of Royal Bayreuth in an "Antique Treasures" segment next year. Members will be informed by Newsletter when broadcast dates and times become available.

According to the Club's constitution, dues must be approved on a year-to-year basis. Bob Gollmar made a motion, seconded by Becky Conrad and Tim Sullivan, to hold family membership dues to \$30 next

year. The motion passed unanimously.

A luncheon will be held at 11:45 in the Hospitality Room. Following a 1:00 program on Antiques Restoration by DiAnna Tindell, rooms will be open for visitation according to a floor-by-floor schedule. Members with RB to sell or display were asked to keep their rooms open at these specified times. The banquet will begin at 7:00, and the winners of the "World's Most Unusual" contest will be announced at that time.

Chuck Heerhold made a motion to adjourn, seconded by Alvin Cappel. The motion passed, and the meeting adjourned at 11:20.

#### BANQUET October 2, 1999 @ 7:00 p.m.

Members of the RBCCI attended a great banquet dinner on Saturday evening. After the dinner, Bob Gollmar presented plaques to outgoing officers Tim Gaudet, Judy White and Jack Biddlecome for their years of service to the Club.

Awards were presented for the "Worlds Most Unusual Royal Bayreuth" contest:

Figural, Mary McCaslin, Cat Head

Scenic, Nancy & Brian Owen, Work Horse Pocket Watch Holder.

Judges' Award - Richard Chubb - Clover Creamer.

Newly elected officers and directors were installed. Mary and Bob McCaslin received special recognition for their efforts in furthering interest, knowledge, and enthusiasm. Convention volunteers were also thanked for their efforts in making this convention so successful.

Entertainment was provided by Pauline Brick with audience participation. Her presentation, "Why, Grandma, What Nice Figurals You Have," was thoroughly enjoyed by everyone present and Alvin Cappel has never looked so voluptuous!

#### BOARD OF DIRECTORS MEETING

OCTOBER 2, 1999 @ 9:45 PM

Following the banquet dinner, installation of officers, and delightful entertainment by Pauline Brick ("why, Grandma, What Nice Figurals You Have!"), the Board of Directors held a closed meeting. President Bob McCaslin asked for ideas and suggestions from past members of the Board in attendance.

Tim Gaudet felt that more cooperation was needed on the part of the hosting hotels before a contractual agreement is signed for future conventions. He also questioned whether auctions should be open to the public if it means that auction prices would also be made public. Bob felt that the convention should be limited to members only,

and a discussion ensued. Paul Toland, auction chairman, was asked for input, and he, too, felt that the Club's auction should be private. Paul added that next year's auction will be limited to 150 items. He indicated that only members will be allowed to submit items, and asked the Board if it would be wise to include an insurance disclaimer on the consignment forms so that consignors would realize that the Club would not carry insurance on auction items. Paul also asked that \$1,400 for auction expenses be allocated in the budget. After further discussion. Board members decided to limit the auction to members Prospective members would join with the understanding that auction prices would not be published in a trade journal. Several Board members stated that any last minute changes in auction procedure should be announced prior to the sale of the first item.

Judy White recommended that directors consider Club members who are not able to come to the convention. She made the following ways in which all members could benefit:

- 1. Bound membership directory booklets.
- 2. Higher membership fee charged to convention attendees or reduced membership fee for those

not able to attend.

- 3. Research articles published in the Newsletters.
- 4. Color photographs in the Newsletter.
- 5. Educational articles in each Newsletter.
- 6. Video of convention exhibits, Show and Tell, Rare and Unusual, to be made available to all members.

Jack Biddlecome reported that he has been informed by the IRS that the RBCCI is now considered not-for-profit social club incorporated in New York. Jack stated that records of the Club's tax status and incorporation was never passed on from Jim Davis' possession, and that the directors need to take action on the nonprofit status to keep that status active. Deb Tuttle urged the Board to authorize Jack to write Sandy Heerhold a check for \$1,000 to open an account. Jack should continue to write checks on the current account until all convention expenses have been Board members were in paid. agreement.

Former Board members left, and Bob McCaslin continued with new business. Under constitutional guidelines, the President must appoint a Newsletter Editor. Alma

Biddlecome was asked to continue, and she accepted. The Board approved of and thanked Alma for continuing in this position. Alma stated that she has received many articles from members, but more articles are always needed. It was felt that Richard Schwartz should be contacted to submit an article on tapestry. All past Board members will be asked to submit an article for the March, 2000 Newsletter, and all current Board members will be asked to submit an article for the June Newsletter. Treasurer, Sandy Heerhold, will submit a budget article in the September, 2000 Newsletter and in as many other Newsletters as possible. Gaudet recommended following up on Judy White's suggestion to include color inserts in the Newsletters, and Alma Biddlecome was asked to obtain an estimate for Board approval.

Bob Gollmar recommended providing each member with an updated membership directory and copy of the current Club constitution. He also recommended providing a copy of the constitution and by-laws in the June, 2000 Newsletter.

Judy Stockwell, Joeleen Passow, and Debra Tuttle were asked to follow up on obtaining free advertising in the major antique journals.

Bob Gollmar will provide articles on Club news for the Antique Trader March and July, 2000 issues. Bob was also asked to serve on the nominating committee with Karen Church and one additional member who was not yet selected.

Under Old Business, the rank order of comped hotel rooms was once again discussed. Before a contract is signed, Board members determined that the following rooms should be provided at no charge: Hospitality Room; 2 Rooms for Hospitality Co-Chairs; Auction Display Room; 1 Room for the Club President.

The parameters of future convention sites were then discussed. Bev Brumbaugh made a motion to set the eastern boundary at Harrisburg / Philadelphia and the western boundary at Denver. Alvin Cappel seconded, and the motion was passed unanimously.

Debra Tuttle will work with Embassy Suites in Kansas City; Chuck Heerhold will check out a potential Denver site: McCaslin will work with Richard Chubb on the Harrisburg site. It was reported that DiAnna Tindell, convention speaker, received one night's lodging. Rosenboom, auctioneer, received 2 night's lodging, and Tim Gaudet, President, received 4 night's lodging. (Tim indicated that he wished to reimburse half of his paid lodging to the Club.) These rooms were paid by the Club, and were not comped by the hotel

involving the convention auction. Among the items discussed were raising the sales commission, the private versus public auction, doing away with reserves, and charging extra for unsold items that had to be shipped back to the owners. Harriet Land moved and Bev Brumbaugh seconded to retain the 8% sales commission with a maximum commission of \$150 on all sold items, charge a \$10 fee for all unsold items, and give the Board the right to determine auction rules. Nine members voted to pass the motion; two members abstained. The Board also discussed the possibility of doing away with a private club auction and authorizing the auction chairman to locate an outside collection. Some Board members felt that unsold items that were shipped back to their owners should be charged more than \$10.

Concerning the 2000 Indianapolis, Convention in Becky Conrad will chair the Hospitality Room with Roberta Cappel and two other members assisting. Bob McCaslin introduced the concept of the "Year 2000 Cookie Caper" in which all board members will make a cookie or cash donation to the Hospitality Room.

Board members approved having Alma Biddlecome send Deb Tuttle a current membership list. Deb will bind the list into a booklet format along with a copy

of the constitution and by-laws.

A discussion of the budget resulted in the following guidelines: Auction Expense \$1,500 Hospitality Room \$1,000 Conventions Packets \$400.

It was agreed to retain a \$10 convention fee for the 2000 Indianapolis Convention. The Board also approved Mary McCaslin's request to put a membership form in each of her new books for a to-be-determined fee.

Board members discussed whether it was necessary to maintain two separate accounts for the Club and Auction. It was decided to combine the two accounts in one. All major expenditures will still need to be approved by the President or, in his absence, the Vice President.

Mary McCaslin reported that the Tettau factory has agreed to produce a special commemorative mug for the 2000 convention. The Board would need to place an order in the near future. The mug would feature a map of the convention site, Indianapolis, Indiana, on the front with the RB crest and "Special Edition 2000" on the bottom. Board members advised Mary to obtain a price and contact Board members for price approval.

Nancy Rublaitus agreed to continue as Club Historian. She requested photos and items from the West Coast for the scrapbook.

Bob Gollmar thanked everyone present for their hard work and

dedication. Sandy Heerhold moved to adjourn. Everyone else present seconded the motion, and the meeting ended at 12:30.

spring and fall, Kennedy Productions sponsors the classy Pheasant Run Antique Show, which attracts many serious collectors as well as the merely curious.

And this year's first show in March was no exception, as about 80 dealers exhibited some of the finest pieces from their collections before a packed house.

Among them was Becky Conrad. wonderfully knowledgeable dealer whose shop, Beth's Antiques Monticello, IN, features the Sunbonnet Babies series in fine china by Royal Bayreuth. Conrad's outstanding collection contained the set of seven sandwich dessert plates illustrating the Mother Goose days-of-the-week nursery rhyme that goes, "This is the way we..." The pattern on Monday's plate depicts the Sunbonnet Baby washing clothes, Tuesday's plate shows her ironing, Wednesday's plate has her mending clothing, and Thursday's plate shows her scrubbing the floor. A variation of Thursday's pattern shows her washing a window. Friday's pattern is that of sweeping the floor, while Saturday's pattern shows the Sunbonnet Baby baking goodies. And, the pattern for Sunday shows them fishing.

The Saturday plate in Conrad's collection is a reproduction by the company, which is still in production in

Germany. "There never has been a Saturday baking plate found in the old Sunbonnets," Conrad noted. The reproductions are identified and dated on the backs of each. For example, a Saturday plate will say, "Special Edition - 1974." she said.

She also has the Sunbonnet Belles series, which consists of a matching plate, cup and saucer for each day of the week. All the Sunbonnets range in price from \$200 to \$1,000 each, said Conrad, who has over 100 pieces in inventory at this time.

Conrad collects nothing for herself; everything is for sale. She has three pickers in New Zealand who send more Sunbonnet pieces weekly. The week of the Pheasant Run Show, one of her pickers sent a little match holder/sugar scoop in Sunbonnet: "A shape I have never seen in the United States before," said Conrad.




