Little Rhody Facts - Part III

- The biggest bug in the world is on the roof of New England Pest Control just off RT. 95 in Providence – a huge blue termite weighing two tons. He's 9 feet high and 58 feet long- 928 times the size of a real termite. And yes, his name is Nibbles Woodaway.
- Rhode Island may be the smallest state in the United States but it has the longest name. Officially the Ocean State is the Commonwealth of Rhode Island and Providence Plantations. – 49 letters.
- The oldest 4th of July parade dates back to 1780 and is held in Bristol, RI. The line down the center of Main Street in Bristol is painted red, white and blue.
- Rhode Island is the birthplace of the American Industrial Revolution. Samuel Slater memorized the details for every piece of machinery in an English factory and built the first textile mill in America producing cotton on the Blackstone River in 1793 from memory.
- The jewelry industry in the US began in Providence, RI and is still centered there today.
- Rhode Island, one of the original 13 colonies, was founded by Roger Williams, who came here to avoid religious persecution and settled in Providence.
- The first public roller skating rink was built in RI in 1866.
- The statue on top of the State Capital in Providence is that of "the Independent Man."
- The first golf course in the US was built in Rhode Island in 1890.

 - ✓ Ruth Ann Buzzi - comedian and actress
 - ✓ George M. Cohan - composer and actor
 - ✓ Nelson Eddie - singer and actor
 - ✓ Debra Messing – actress (TVs Will and Grace)
 - ✓ Gilbert Stuart – portrait artist who painted 5 presidents (known for several portraits of George Washington. One of Stuart's picture of Washington is on the one dollar bill)
 - ✓ Linda Titus - Newsletter Editor







Our other son John was killed at age 25 by a drunk driver 15 years ago. We have two Basset Hound show dogs (both champions) and are also collectors of Warwick Pottery made in Wheeling WV. Ken owns Peterboro Tool Co. and has a web site <http://www.ptool.com/>. I, Judy, am retired from my secretarial jobs with Brookstone Co. and Village Outfitters, and managing two video stores for 15 years in Peterborough. I am active in the Peterborough Historical Society, Yankee Bottle Club, The Peterborough Players (Summer Theatre including Children Theatre) on the board of the Pilgrim Basset Hound Club and the Basset Hound Club of America. I have gone to the dogs.

What Types Of Royal Bayreuth Do You Collect?

We collect crows and other figurals, all sizes and pieces, shoes, vases, musicians, cavaliers, rose tapestry. We just love all of it. Our cabinets are full.

How Did You Get Started In Collecting Royal Bayreuth?

Shortly after we were married (45 years August 2005) we received some rose tapestry pieces from my (Judy's) godmother (still alive and 96 years old). These pieces belonged to her husband's family. We took a look at them, the tray, hair receiver and hat pin holder and did not care for them but what could we do? We put them into the cabinet and let them sit there. One day about 20 years ago we looked at them and they looked much nicer to us so we went off to antique shops and found some more, and more, and then we joined the club and bought the price guides, went to Germany to see the factory and the area and the rest is history.

What Is Your Favorite Royal Bayreuth Piece?


Ken says his favorite piece is a Devil and Cards Water pitcher that he purchased from Jim Davis, the president of RBCC at the time. Ken likes the piece because it belonged to Jim, and because Jim is no longer with us, it makes it special. Tour of the Varnum Armory



On Saturday, September 24, 2005, we have planned an extra event after lunch; a private tour of the Varnum Continentals Armory which is about a 10-15 minute ride from the hotel. The Varnum Continentals is an historic re-enactment organization with the largest collection of American military history in Rhode Island, and one of the most significant collections on the East Coast. It is a hidden treasure. Don Marcum, a well known local military historian will conduct the tour for us. We need to share rides so let us know when you register if you plan on attending.

The Varnum Continentals built their Armory in 1913 in the medieval architectural style. The armory is

listed on the National Register of Historic Places. A 1984 State Historical Building Survey described the Varnum Memorial Armory as remaining in perfect original condition. Among the key architectural details are the towers, the massive double doors, the multiple arched windows, and the wonderful crenellated parapet along the roofline.

The armory serves as the Varnum Continental's headquarters and contains an extensive Military & Naval Museum which has been acquired through donation and purchase. It has a large drill hall (40 x 110) now used for public functions.



Among the items of interest in the Military museum are:

- Military weapons & artifacts from the 16th century to the present
- Collection of over 600 original WWI & II posters from the United States, France, England and Canada
- Official museum collection of the 76th Infantry Division, covering its activities from WWI to deactivation in 1994
- Colt Model 1883 Gatling Gun and Limber and several artillery pieces from the Revolutionary War to WWI
- Historic military uniforms
- Historic military pictures, including RI Militia units, Civil War, etc.
- Extensive military library including training manuals, histories, uniforms, equipment and weapons
- Historical documents including militia commissions, appointments, land titles, etc. dating from the 17th century, including documents signed by Washington and Governor Stephen Hopkins, who later signed the Declaration of Independence
- RI Train of Artillery leather helmet worn by Capt/Lt. Benijah Carpenter when he was killed at the Battle of Long Island August 27, 1776
- Military medal and ribbon collection
- Collection of pictures of early coastal steam packets


