Kunstkammer

While reading *Arts & Antiques* Magazine, I came across a word that I had to know more about. It is "Kunstkammer". It is pronounced Kunst-kam-mer. It is of German derivation and certainly fits our RB collections and others we might have. Your RB cabinets are certainly "Kunstkammers". In our case the whole house is one.

Before museums flung open their doors, eager to display the treasures of the ages, there was the "Kunstkammer", or to give it its full name, Kunst-und Wanderkammer. This German label, affixed by early art historians, denotes both the "chambers of art and marvels" beloved of Renaissance princes and the cabinet of curiosities" that delighted more modest collectors. And despite the name, the typical Kunstkammer occupied far more than just one room; many enthusiasts filled entire homes with omnivorous assemblages of art works, antiquities, natural history objects, and bizarre curiosities.

In the last few months I have become a docent at Tinker Swiss Cottage and Museum in Rockford, IL. Mr. Tinker was born in 1836 and died in 1924. In his two story library in the Swiss house he has a Kunstkammer in the corner of the second floor. It contains a myriad of things he collected and picked up throughout his life. The house contains over 95% of his original Victorian things.

As a docent I have access to all the items and records to study. I noticed two 14" tall tapestry ormolu mounted vases under a window mantle in the parlor. They are a true pair as they are mirror images. I will be able to remove the metal bases and try to find a maker's mark. Could they be RB? Tune in to the next newsletter.

How about a professional baseball game under the stars? Memphis is home to the St. Louis Cardinals AAA team known as the Memphis Redbirds. They play at AutoZone

Park; a world class minor league park with a great view from any seat and the best bar-b-que nachos around. Trust me on this one.

Do you feel lucky? A short drive to Tunica, MS and you will be in Little Las Vegas. Bring your wallet and your appetite and enjoy what the many casinos have to offer.

And for you history buffs, there's the National Civil Rights Museum located at the Lorraine Hotel, the sight of Martin Luther King, Jr.'s assassination. Walk back in time and feel the emotions of the civil rights movement.



Restoration Presentation Scheduled for Memphis

I have been asked by your board to make a presentation on restoration for the upcoming convention. My name is Nadine Sidmore, and my company, Sidmore Restoration, has been restoring fine porcelain for 18 years. I will be sharing with the membership some tips on how to detect previous restorations, as well as the difference between repair and proper restoring. There will also be information on what you should expect when dealing with a professional restorer: the realistic length of time for the work to be done, guarantee of quality of work and also to answer any questions you might have about the process.

Of course it is not possible in an hour-long seminar to teach the actual "art of restoration", so this presentation will be more of a question and answer format. If you have any items that you are considering for restoration, please bring them to Memphis for estimates/discussion with me. If you choose to go ahead and have the work done in my studio, I can take the pieces back with me after the session, saving you the cost of shipping one way. I'll look forward to meeting you in Memphis.


