



Vintage RB Ad Found

When I was clearing the clutter from my den I came across a binder that contained 6 issues of a magazine called "Acquire". They appear to be published every other month, and these are from 1974/75. It cost \$2.50 per magazine. The magazine was for "Contemporary Collectibles and Antiquities".

As I flipped through them I read some of the letters to the editor. Many people wrote about how expensive the magazine was. I went to the inflation calculator and found \$2.50 in1975 would be \$10.80 in 2008 (latest one can get figures). I guess that was high. I then did a reverse look up for our dues of \$30.00 and what it would have been in 1975 and it came to \$6.50. I think that shows we continue to be a good value.

As I was going through the issues, I came across the March 1975 issue. The back of the back cover had the words "Royal Bayreuth". It was an ad by Commemorative Imports of Bayport MN. It talks about RB entering the contemporary limited editions market in 1972. Christmas plate in '72,



Mother's Day plate in 73', and Easter Egg in 74'. Also in1974 Sun-Bonnet Baby plates were reintroduced. 1975 brought out Devil and Cards Pitcher & Tankard. The pitcher was serially numbered in an edition of 1000. The tankard was 2000 pcs. Prices on the order blank were:

- Mother's Day \$25.00
- Easter Egg \$13.50
- Pitcher \$75.00
- Tankard \$50.00

Replica Santa Claus Review

The picture of a Santa Claus candy jar with a lid (pictured at right) is a piece made by the "Victorian Trading Co". It is listed as a 'Replica' in their magazine, which means an 'exact' copy. So, I ordered one for \$12.99 plus shipping to see what it looked like. It is definitely NOT a Replica! Royal Bayreuth does not have a candy jar with a lid. It is NOT a reproduction (copy) for the same reason. The measurements do not meet any piece that we have, and the material that it is made of is a cheaper dolomite from Italy and far below the porcelain that Royal Bayreuth is made of. Any true collector will not be fooled as soon as it is picked-up. Someone that does not collect Royal Bayreuth may pick it up and think they have found a 'sleeper', however it is signed "Victorian Trading Co" under the glaze on the bottom. It also has a paper sticker with "Made in China" on it. That satisfied my curiosity, but, then it made me a little mad and I called them back and told them of the discrepancies, and of course, that was the end of it. I feel better now. Ha!



From the Auction Chair

Now is the time to think about the pieces of Royal Bayreuth you can part with. The Club Auction will be held at the convention in Peoria, IL on Friday, October 8. That's right; the auction is only six months away, so there is no time to waste. Currently, we have approximately 15 pieces designated for the auction. We need many more to have a successful auction! If you know of anyone who wants to downsize a collection or make room for other pieces, please encourage them to think of our auction as a way of passing their treasures on to a new collector. The Club has made it easier than ever for members to consign pieces.

Here are the auction rules for 2010 in Peoria:

- 1. Bidders must be current club members. A bidder number is required to bid and will be made available prior to the auction.
- 2. Absentee bids, mail bids, and e-mail bids are accepted but must be received by the Auction Chairman prior to the auction.
- 3. All auction items are offered on an "as is" basis. The RBCC encourages you to thoroughly inspect items before bidding.
- 4. All pieces will be made available for inspection prior to the auction.
- 5. The auction is planned for Friday evening of the convention. Room and times will be provided in the Convention Agenda.
- 6. Changes to the items or descriptions may occur during the auction. Statements made by the Auctioneer take precedence over this catalog.
- 7. In the event of a dispute, the judgment of the Auctioneer is final.
- 8. For 2010 both the seller's fee and the no sale/did not meet reserve fee have been waived.
- 9. Seller may set a minimum reserve on any piece and can bid his/her own reserves, have another club member bid the reserve or ask the auction committee to bid them. The club is not held responsible for any errors/misunder-standings if the Club is asked to bid the reserves.
- 10. The RBCC buyer's premium is normally 5% but has been waived for 2010. There is no buyers premium for 2010!
- 11. All items must be paid for, picked up and taken home the evening of the club auction. Any delivery fee is the responsibility of the purchaser. Alternate pickup may be arranged through the Auction Chairman in advance of the auction. Items may not be removed from the auction table until paid for.
- 12. Payment in full either by check or cash is required at the close of the auction. Should the successful bidder not pay for the item at the close of the auction the item may be awarded to the next highest bidder at the discretion of the auction officials.
- 13. Some photo images in the auction catalog may deviate slightly from the true color due to variance in monitors or printing.
- 14. Any items not sold at the auction must be picked immediately following the end of the auction. All shipping costs to return unsold items are the responsibility of the owner.

Various Hunt Scenes Used as Decorations

Until I started collecting the R.B. miniatures, I had very few pieces of scenic with hunt scenes, and didn't realize how many different decals there are for this series. I do know that many of the miniatures come with these scenes. It seems most of these items went to England, Australia, or New Zealand, and still show up on ebay from these places. Most of these miniatures are not marked, but enough are to establish their credibility.

It would seem that those from the Bayreuth company either especially liked the hunting décor or found that they sold very well. In the figurals, there are many horse and dog pieces, not to mention the fox and other "hunted" animals. The scenic have work horses, but also feature the woman leaning on the horse, the Arabs on horseback, and the Corinthians on white horses.

One hunt series features a hunter with dogs: one with a gun at rest, another with a gun pointed toward the sky. Two others feature the hunter with a pole and the hounds.

There is a set of small dresser dishes that are shaped with hunting forms: a horseshoe with leaves, a hunting horn, and two different stirrup figural dishes.

I am so grateful to Mary McCaslin for her research and extensive visits to people to take pictures of

> their collections so that we can see the variety of these pieces. You can find pictures of most of them in her two books. I have also sent copies of my draft of this article to several people to see if they had any additions or corrections to help make this "study" as up-to-date as possible. Probably the most common of the hunt scenes

are those that depict fox hunters and hounds. These decals are found on varied RB items, including dresser items, a multitude of vases, desk sets, and dishes. Even the tapestry items are seen with the dreadful hounds and stag in stream, though I haven't seen any of the other scenes on the tapestry.

So far, I have found these separate decals: Two figures, one man in red coat on a brown horse, one woman in either black or blue on a white horse. with hounds; two figures, man in a red coat, white horse, woman in black on a white horse, with hounds (either to the side or in front of the horse riders; one figure woman in a black coat, brown horse, hounds in front; one figure, man in red on a brown horse, dogs in foreground (these single figures often show up in sets of vases); eight figures riding on



a coach pulled by four brown horses, some showing an inn in the background; one man, red coat, brown horse, near a woman driving a wagon pulled by one horse; one woman in a blue coat on a gray horse at a stable with a groom holding the reins, among hounds; four mounted figures amidst a pack of hounds, building in the background; three men on horses with a lady in the door of a cottage, hounds; one piece in (Book 1, figure 27) of one hound with a farm in the back ground; and one unusual "outlined" decal with two horsemen and hounds jumping a fence (Book 2, figure 546). It is surprising how much detail is in each drawing since they are often very small

decals. As I mentioned earlier, they often decorate the miniatures, but also the small creamers, toothpicks, and vases. I wonder if these items sell as well in England now that fox hunting has been outlawed. However, I am attracted to these pieces even though I am not a hunting fan.

If you have pieces with other scenes, would you send pictures to Editor Kat Thacker for inclusion in a future newsletter. This is one way we can all further our knowledge of our Royal Bayreuth.

The Strange Case of Who made Cock Robin

I remember discussions at the conventions on the idea that Royal Bayreuth often would supply other porcelain makers with "blanks" to be used as they would. We are assuming this is the case here. We would welcome any comments to confirm or deny this opinion. On to the next caper.

RB Corinthian Ware

Editor's note: Make sure and check out just a "small sampling" of Don's extensive Corinthian Ware collection in "Our China Cabinets" on the back page!

I have collected Corinthian Ware for almost 25 years. My first introduction to it was from a dealer whom I met at local auctions and he suggested that rather than buy antiques randomly, I should focus on one and start a collection. Little did he know what he was starting since I now have over 200 pieces. I chose



Corinthian Ware because its classic theme appealed to me as did the black and white coloring. Originally I wasn't aware of the colour variations until I bought Virginia Sutton-Salley's book and then the search began in earnest.

The rarest pieces that I have are a pearl grey bell as well as a black and white invalid feeder. I have categorized my collection by color and decoration with the rarest pattern definitely those with children and what I call the "three muses". Since I have no references as to specific decorations, color names etc., I have for convenience, chosen my own. When I refer to "a colored ground" I hope everyone accepts that the ground is actually the finish and not the porcelain which is always white and forms the pattern.

I think my favorite color is the blue although the multicolored pieces are very appealing as well. My most exciting find was at an outdoor antique show were a dealer had two water pitchers that were unmarked and I purchased them for \$75 for the pair. Bargains are always exciting and not soon forgotten. As with most Royal Bayreuth there are a vast number of shapes and sizes and molds and the search will continue to fill in any "holes" in the collection.

RB Corinthian Ware Color and Pattern Variations in Order of Frequency:

1. White classical figures - usually adults (rarely children) and "muses" on black matte background with:

- a) gold trim
- b) white or coral interior
- c) Greek Key border
- 2. Colored figures on black ground with: a) coral lining
 - b) Acanathus leaf border
- 3. White figures on rust gound with: a) gold trim
 - b) green lining
 - c) Greek Key border or variation
 - d) rarely with "Greek Ware" mark
- 4. Colored figures on rust band on black ground with:
- a) green lining
- b) Acanathus Leaf border
- 5. White figures on lemon yellow ground with: a) gold trim
 - b) tan lining
 - c) tan outline of figures
 - d) Greek Key border
- 6. White figures on apple green ground with: a) gold trim
 - b) red lining
 - c) Greek Key border
- 7. White figures on emerald green ground with: a) gold trim
 - b) red lining
 - c) Greek Key border or variation
 - d) often seen with "Greek Ware" mark
- 8. White figures on a blue ground with:
 - a) gold trim and highlights
 - b) lemon yellow lining
 - c) Greek Key border or variation
 - d) "Greek Ware" mark exclusively
- 9. White figures on pearl grey ground with:a) gold highlightsb) Greek Key border

It would appear that all molds were decorated in all color variations and that the Acanthus Leaf borders were limited to colored decorated pieces. The "Greek Ware" mark seems limited to rust, emerald green and blue grounds. Pieces with Sterling rims were for export to the British market where the hallmarked silver rims were applied.
