

Total sales for the auction were more than \$12,000; the highest sales we've had in the last few years. Those in attendance seemed to really enjoy themselves. We appreciate Rollie's efforts to cajole, elicit and entice every dollar he could for the sellers.

At the annual meeting (in a hard fought campaign not to be nominated as next year's auction chair) I lost my bid to be a one term office holder. Since no one else was nominated, I got the job once again by default with one dissenting vote (My OWN!). Actually, if club members continue to support the auction as they did this year, I am pleased to be the auction chair once again.


As I reminded the RBCC members who attended the convention, a successful auction depends on two ingredients; eager sellers who are willing to consign excellent pieces

Now I need another hundred and twenty five great pieces. If you are aware of members or others who are selling off collections, especially figural collections, please encourage the owners to consider selling at our club auction. Recording Secretary's Report:

Janet Belcher recording secretary was unable to attend convention. A motion was made by Alvin Cappel and seconded by Chuck Heerhold to accept the minutes as they were printed in the December newsletter. The motion was passed.

Treasurer's Report: Harriet Land reported the balance at the end of last year was \$13,622.04. The receipts for the year were \$29,659.04 and the disbursements were \$17,027.37. This leaves the balance as of September 28, 2010 of \$12,631.67. A motion was made by Chuck Heerhold and seconded by Steve Bartlett to accept the treasurer's report. The motion was

passed. Harriet also notified the club that the auction for this year totaled \$12,540.

Secretary's Report: Chris Bartlett reported the total club members was 125 with 2 new members for a total of 127. A motion was made by Chuck Heerhold and seconded by Paul Stratman to accept the secretary's report and the motion passed.

Auction Report: Steve Bartlett reports that 70-75% of the pieces in the auction sold this year and that our

club auction is only as good as the pieces that are brought into it. Everyone felt it was an excellent job both by Steve and Chris. A motion was made by Paul Stratman and seconded by Alvin Cappel to accept the auction report. The motion was passed.

Hospitality Room Report: Joanne Lundquist reports that \$600 was spent by hospitality for both the Pie Social and the Pizza & Salad dinner. She wanted to also thank Paul Stratman, Nancy Rublaitus and Jay Rublaitus for their work. Thanks to those who brought homemade goodies. This was a great hospitality room-very roomy.

Editor Report: Kat Thacker reports that everyone likes the separation in the roster with the States being back in it. She reported 400 flyers were sent out from Woody's Auction List advertising the convention. We need to have a formal written thank you sent to him for the use of his list. Clum's Auction service uses our R.B. list as his mailing list. A total of 40 press releases were sent out digitally but she never hears back if they were sent out from there. One known publication of our convention information was in Antique Week dated 9/13/10. Kat is requesting any photos be sent to her.

Website Report: Gregg Thacker reports the website changed hosts twice and the club is now picking up that cost. It's \$140 per year to host the site and \$10 a year for the name. A benefactor will turn it over to the club this year. Gregg states we get between 500-800 visitors to the website a month. The peak month was August. Bob Gollmar offered to pay \$150 for next year for the cost of the website.

An audit was performed by Alan Belcher and Alvin Cappel on the Treasurer's books and found to be in order. A motion was made by Bob McCaslin and seconded by Joanne Lundquist to accept the findings. The motion passed.

A discussion was made to continue the \$30 membership fee. A motion was made by Bob Gollmar and seconded by Nancy Rublaitus to accept the fee and was accepted.

Alvin Cappel opened the annual business meeting.

Kat Thacker reports a dues notice will be in the December newsletter. Chris Bartlett reports that most people paid their dues at convention. The dues need to be in by the end of January. Kat will put out flood e-mails two times (after convention and at the end of December) to remind people of their dues needing renewed.

Kat also discussed the cost was \$250 for the flyers that were sent out to the people on Woody's Auction list in hopes of attracting new members. It was her impression that this was a one time use. 

Santas Visited: Some musings, hopefully not ramblings, on the Santa Claus series

Arguably, the most popular grouping of all Royal Bayreuth figurals is the Santa Claus series. This is reflected in the prices pieces of this grouping still command even in today's soft market. While the prices are not what they once were, they are still significant. It is my firm belief they will rise again in the not-to-distant future.

There are several reasons for this. First, there is the popularity of the character himself. Who doesn't like Santa Claus, save for the Philadelphia Eagle football fans who booed and pelted him with snowballs at halftime of the infamous football game at the old Franklin Field?

Next is the rarity of the pieces in this series. While it has been my very good fortune to have had all of the known pieces in one color or another over the years I've been collecting, finding them was not easy. More seem to be coming out now than in the past. I think that is a further reflection of the present economic times. People are selling them after they have enjoyed them for awhile, because they need the monies for some good reason. I myself have parted with most of my pieces in this series so that I had and continued to have the financial wherewithal to put my remaining two children at home through college and professional school (the expenses of such schooling are astounding, if not outrageous!).

Last, but not least, is the sheer quality of the molds for these pieces and of the hand painting involved. The colors are vibrant, be it red, green, or brown. The facial and clothing details are superb. One or two pieces give a glimpse of the greatness of this series; having an entire collection revealed the true genius of the artists involved in both the creation and execution of this series. I will remember that collection always.

Pieces in this series are usually, but not always, marked. Often the Deponiert mark or some variant of it appears as well. I have found the handled pieces to be rarer than those with the nap-sack only. Also, contrary to the conventional wisdom, I believe green and not brown to be the rarest color. I only ever had the green candy dish

in addition to a green hat on the smaller humidor (which had the red base, a piece from Jim Davis' collection for which I traveled to his home in upstate New York). Not painting the holly on Santa's hat in the brown is common; I believe this was done in keeping with the Continental image of him.

There have been attempted imitations of pieces in this series by others, notably the Japanese. In my opinion, they are far inferior in all facets, mold, painting, and weight. There is a certain "feel" to an RB piece that is almost impossible to duplicate. That's not a bad legacy for so-called novelty ware at the time to be exported for literally nickels and dimes overseas.



I almost fainted and/or dropped it! I informed the man calmly I would take it... and he carried it up to the counter. Gregg in the meantime was combing through a huge pile of old Detroit postcards, and wanted to
