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A Matter of Three

I present here another example of the ever-possible surprises that I have come to expect since becoming a collector of Royal Bayreuth.

Included in the devil and card pieces I inherited upon my stepfather's death was the covered sugar bowl. As I have said, I often search eBay auctions to see what devil and cards pieces are offered to monitor pricing and of course in hopes of discovering pieces not yet in my collection. In 2009 I noticed a covered sugar listed by a seller from Japan (this piece remains unsold) whose cover had a devil with a head obviously not the same as mine. Through communication with fellow collectors and sharing photos, I saw more of this alternate mold. I was finally able to get one of these at the right price

in 2010. This month, August 2011, I discovered yet another version I hadn't seen elsewhere, and now have this third cover form. Through subsequent research and discussions with knowledgeable collectors this last found example might be what some have speculated to be pre-production "test" pieces, having no marking except incised mold numbers, and not meant for distribution. As well as the devil cover difference, the overall scale of this piece is smaller and the cards forming the bowl of the base have a more pronounced curve to them than the commonly known version.

The accompanying photos I submit for your consideration and enjoyment. Your thoughts on these molds or other devil and cards mold variations would be welcomed.

They say that almost everyone who goes to Pittsburgh ends up on Mt. Washington to take in the breathtaking view. Mt. Washington can be reached by the Monongahela Incline (also known as FUNiculars). Roberta says that is debatable, the Duquesne incline still utilizes the two original 1877 wooden cable cars! If you'd rather pop quarters in the slots, the Meadows Racetrack and Casino is nearby! The Royal Bayreuth Jester



We're showcasing our own "April Fool" the RB Jester for this Spring issue. You are probably surprised to see that I (a jester novice) have written this article. I felt compelled to discover as much information as possible once we decided on this theme for April. Not much on the internet. There were some interesting phone conversations between our club experts the Heerholds/Andersons and myself on this subject. Quite a lot is still unknown about this area of collecting, so feel free to give us feedback or share your own experience to illuminate us on this subject!

A wide variety of forms and designs are to be found in the jester pattern: ashtrays, candlesticks, clip/pen holder, covered boxes, creamer, milk, water and lemonade pitchers, hanging match holder, inkwell, paperweight, pipe humidors, stickpin holder and wall pockets.

These are the different sayings found combined with the jester image on each piece:

- Penny in pocket is a merry companion
- Come and welcome, pass by no offence
- Many kiss the child for the nurses sake
- Never say die, up man and try
- More than enough is too much
- Welcome is the best cheer
- A kindly word cools the anger
- Think twice speak but once It is acknowledged that the original signed drawings were created by renowned porcelain designer Charles



Noke (of Royal Doulton fame) in the late 1890's, early 1900's. Since the Royal Bayreuth factory was somewhat arbitrary in it's markings, positive dating on these pieces is

next to impossible. We have attempted to figure out when the work was actually done for RB. According to Mary's research, he was never on record as an employee of RB, nor was there any known connection between the RB and Doulton factories. Did Noke create these images BEFORE he went to work for Doulton (did they showcase his abilities/help him get the job in 1889???), or was he simply freelancing WHILE he was working for Doulton? His employer must have known about him working with the RB factory. He also created jesters for Doulton. Would there have been no conflict of interest back then? If any of our members have additional information about this - we'd certainly



appreciate their sharing it with us all!

It appears Noke's several different drawings were made into multiple sizes of sepia-colored transfers which were hand-applied to each piece. The diversity in expressions/positions of the figures appears to be from the compression or stretching of the

decals to fit the convex vs. concave contours of porcelain shapes. They can look SO different, I originally thought they were each hand-drawn! Resourceful Terry got out his loupe to confirm the actual printing dot patterns in these areas. So we know these transfers were used on the jesters.

We're guessing here as to the order of application, so here goes... The porcelain blank was first airbrushed in a pale yellow/bright green background color then decals affixed. The jester w/his wand, mask vignette (on the backsides of some pcs), typography/sayings and bells are all transfers. The





sayings were designed in a distinctive calligraphical style of writing. It looks like they were individually cut out and applied word-by-word, since they vary in placement on each piece. The images were then hand-colored with the red, black, yellow and flesh-toned glazes. Decorative line/

brush work was applied (string the bells were hanging from, black and yellow stripy details, etc). Only some of the pieces were marked our experts have found only the blue mark in their years of collecting experience. One thing our experts feel quite certain of, there are more than likely STILL other varieties of the jester out there yet to be discovered!

Many thanks to the Heerholds, Andersons, and Churchs for sharing their expertise (and photos) with me. I learned a great deal about these particular Royal Bayreuth gems and we've hopefully opened up dialog among our members to perhaps solve the mysteries found here.

A Request for YOUR feedback from the Auction Chair

We have been doing our best to brainstorm/improve the annual club's auction. So far, we've received little input from members regarding the auction format they'd like to see for the upcoming convention in Pittsburgh. At the last couple of conventions, some attendees have suggested cutting down on the number of pieces so the auction is shorter and consists of more rare pieces. Another idea is to have one large room where members can display pieces for sale during a set period (in addition to room to room visits). This could be scheduled the day after the auction.

As most RBCC members know, our club auction is traditionally considered one of the highlights of the convention. Our next convention is coming in September. So if you have any other suggestions or thoughts, NOW would be the time to share them. Please email them to me soon at dufferdog@aol.com.

We felt the auction rules were working well this past year. If anyone has any questions, concerns or suggestions about these, please do let me know. Also, if you want to consign pieces for the 2012 auction, please contact me by email or call (401) 885-5889. We are ALWAYS looking for good RB to sell. If you know of a member (or any collector) who has decided to dispose of some (or all) of their collection, please refer them to me so we can pass their treasures on to fellow collectors.

The Club has made it much easier (and more costeffective) the last couple of years for members to consign pieces. Here are the auction rules for 2012 in Pittsburgh:

2012 Auction Rules

- 1. Bidders must be current club members. A bidder number is required to bid and will be made available prior to the auction.
- 2. Absentee bids, mail bids, and e-mail bids are accepted but must be received by the Auction Chairman prior to the auction.
- 3. All auction items are offered on an "as is" basis. The RBCC encourages you or your representative to thoroughly inspect items before bidding.
- 4. The Auction Chair has final approval of all pieces in the auction and the pieces will be made available for inspection prior to the auction.

- 5. The auction is planned for Friday evening of the convention. Room and times will be provided in the Convention Agenda.
- 6. Changes to the items or descriptions may occur during the auction. Statements made by the Auctioneer take precedence over the catalog.
- 7. In the event of a dispute, the judgment of the Auctioneer is final.
- 8. Both the seller's fee and the no sale/did not meet reserve fee have been waived.
- 9. The RBCC buyer's premium is normally 5% but has been waived once again. THERE IS NO BUYERS PREMIUM FOR 2012!!!
- 10. Seller may set a minimum reserve on any piece and can bid his/her own reserves, have another club member bid the reserve or ask the auction committee to bid them. The club is not held responsible for any errors/misunderstandings if the Club is asked to bid the reserves.
- 11. All items must be paid for, picked up and taken home the evening of the club auction. Any delivery fee is the responsibility of the purchaser. Alternate pickup may be arranged through the Auction Chairman in advance of the auction. Items may not be removed from the auction table until paid for.
- 12. Payment in full either by check or cash is required at the close of the auction. Should the successful bidder not pay for the item at the close of the auction the item may be awarded to the next highest bidder at the discretion of the auction Chair.
- 13. Some photo images in the auction catalog may deviate slightly from the true color due to variance in monitors or printing.
- 14. Any items not sold at the auction must be picked immediately following the end of the auction. All shipping costs to return unsold items to absentee sellers are the responsibility of the owner.
