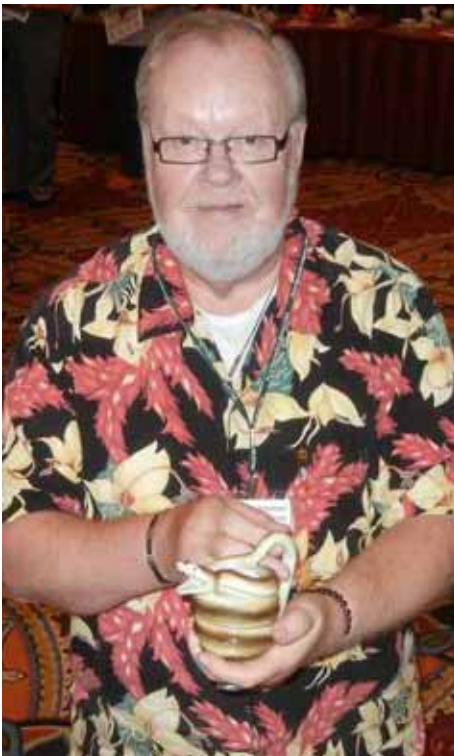

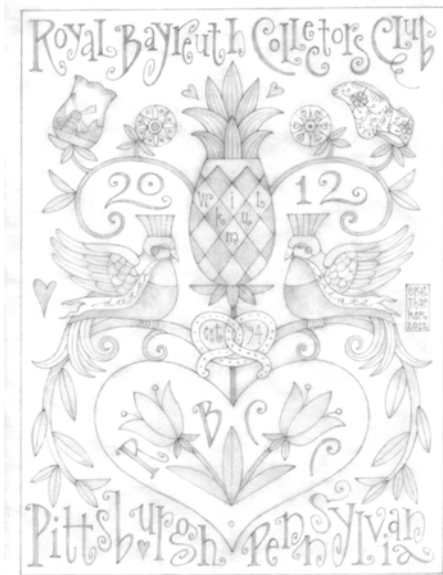

# RBCC Welcome Meeting

Friday, September 21, 2012 10am

President Alvin Cappel opened the Welcome Meeting with the introduction of the officers, board members, editor, and the various committee members including the hospitality room hosts.

New members were recognized and they shared their collecting interests. New members included: Mal and Marguerite Meyerson from New York, Ann Cohen from Palm Beach, Florida, and Joe and Kathy Galler from Delaware.

Recording Secretary's Report: minutes were accepted as published in the December 2011 club newsletter.

Mary Anderson reported that members who usually attend the convention but unable to attend this year were contacted by personal phone

call which was appreciated by our absent members.

Nominating Committee: Jim Lapp and Jay Rublaitus reported that the position of President was still open but Karen Church had accepted the nomination as Vice President. For Board members, Harriet Lavine will be the replacement for Carol Edwards and Mary McCaslin agreed to a second term.

Newsletter Editor: Kat Thacker reported the continued need for articles and photos contributed by the membership so she won't have to repeat past articles.

Web Manager: Gregg Thacker reported on the club website that has had 350,000 hits from 67 countries in the last 30 months. The auction list has drawn interest with 500 hits within the last two months. The club does have Facebook and Twitter accounts and help is needed in keeping them monitored and current. The web hosting fee of \$125 was once again graciously donated by Bob Gollmar.

Entertainment Co-Chairmen: Judy Stockwell and Harriet Lavine announced that they have games and the Yankee Swap planned for the Saturday evening banquet. They handed out a word game for participants to make as many words as possible from the word "Smorgasbord". Prizes will be given for the most words and the longest word.

Audit Committee: Alan Belcher and Bev Brumbaugh (also known as the ABBA audit firm) will audit the treasurer books and have a report for the annual business meeting.

Historian Report: Roberta Cappel reported on the donation of the Doug Wenger collection and mentioned the artistic contribution of Susan Szymanski in a cookbook, a collection of menus and stories behind a number

of elegant dinners and special events. A copy will be available in the hospitality room to enjoy.

Hospitality Room: This social gathering room has been planned and prepared this year by Karen and Carolyn Church, Jim Lapp and Susan Szymanski with many contributions from the attendees. Stop by to visit and take the opportunity to sample Shoo Fly Pie, Whoopie Pies and Dutch Apple Cake.

Auction Report: Steve Bartlett explained the details of the silent auction consisting of 50 items from the Wenger collection, each with a minimum opening bid. Bidding will close at 3:30pm Saturday afternoon with all proceeds going to the club. The Friday evening auction will begin at 7pm with sign up for bid numbers to begin at 6:30. Auctioneer Rollie Rosenboom is unable to attend this year but a local auctioneer (recommended by a club member) has offered his services and will be paid an honorarium.

Convention Sites: Presentations were made and information given by board members regarding possible future convention sites after which four sites were selected. The next two conventions will be determined by a membership vote at the Saturday business meeting. The sites being considered are: Dearborn Inn (Marriott) in Michigan, Marriott Chicago (in Naperville, IL), Embassy Suites North in Indianapolis, and Embassy Suites in St Charles, Missouri.

Alvin Cappel reminded members of the Show and Tell program at 2pm to be followed by room to room visitation. Prior to the auction there will be a "Build your own Pittsburgh Sandwich" at 5pm.

# RBCC Annual Business Meeting

Saturday September 22, 2012 9am

Meeting was opened by President Alvin Cappel

Recording Secretary: minutes were approved as printed in the December 2011 newsletter.

Secretary's Report: Chris Bartlett reported a membership of 127 with 8 new members and 8 who did not renew leaving the total the same as last year. Members not renewing are contacted by a personal telephone call. Dues will remain the same with a two year option for \$55 or \$30 for one year and will be accepted at the convention. Please notify Chris of any e-mail or street address changes to keep our roster current. There are 45 attendees at this convention, nearly the same as last year.

Treasurer's Report: Steve Bartlett reported a checkbook balance of \$10,271.88 as of September 15, 2012.

Receipts totaled \$13,904.80 mostly from membership dues, convention fees and auction sales. Disbursements totaled \$16,652.14 with the major debits being convention expenses, auction sales sent to members and the newsletter. Report was accepted as presented.

Auction Report: Steve Bartlett reported that approximately 55% of the items were sold with proceeds of nearly \$30,000 although the final tally is not completed.

Editor's Report: Kat Thacker reported that the newsletters average 8 to 12 pages with four pages in color. The December 2011 newsletter was larger with 16 pages due to convention coverage. The membership roster is sent with the March issue. Please continue to send articles and photos to share.

Website Manager: Gregg Thacker will be looking into the possibility of selling some of the Wenger collection by way of the club website but details

not ready at this time.

Nominating Committee: Chuck Heerhold announced the new officers for 2013-2015. Co-Presidents will be Mary and Terry Anderson, Vice President Karen Church. Board of Directors candidate is Harriet Lavine and Mary McCaslin agreed to a second term. All other positions remain the same including Chris Bartlett as Secretary and Steve Bartlett as treasurer. The slate of officers was approved.

The nominating co-chairmen will remain the same with Jim Lapp and Jay Rublaitus. The Treasurer position will be up for renewal, one board member will be needed and the Secretary position will be open after the completion of 2 two year terms. Chris Bartlett volunteered to continue for a third term as Secretary with the membership approval. An amendment was made in accordance with article VII, section A of the by-laws to extend the term of Secretary for an additional two year term, ending at the convention in 2015. It was approved by a majority vote of the membership at this annual business meeting.

Audit Report: Alan Belcher and Bev Brumbaugh audited the treasurer books and found them to be in order. The report was accepted as presented.

Mega Convention: Judy Stockwell reported that she has corresponded with clubs with similar collecting interests with the idea of having a larger group to share hotel space and costs. No details or plans have been made as this is still in an information gathering stage.

New Business: There was a review of the four possible convention sites for 2013 and 2014 followed by a membership vote by paper ballot. The results were in favor of Dearborn, Michigan (13 votes) and St. Charles, Missouri (12 votes). Votes for

Chicago/Naperville, IL were 8 and Indianapolis 4. Dates and details will be worked out by the officers and board members.

It was suggested that in honor of the Doug and Georgeann Wenger donation that they be given a lifetime honorary club membership and will be sent a signed copy of Mary McCaslin's Royal Bayreuth Book II as a thank you.

Meeting adjourned at 10:15am followed by a program, "The Netherlands" presented by Karen Church and Roberta Cappel with their Dutch Children pieces.

# RBCC Board of Directors Meeting One

Members in attendance: Alvin Cappel, Mary Anderson, Steve Bartlett, Chris Bartlett, Mary McCaslin, Bob Gollmar, Judy Stockwell, Jim Lapp, and Sandy Heerhold.

Meeting was led by President Alvin Cappel

Recording Secretary's Report: approved as written in the December 2011 club newsletter.

Treasurer's Report by Steve Bartlett: Current balance in checking account is \$10,271.88. This amount reveals a difference of more than \$2,700 from last years' balance of \$13,019.22. With many members taking advantage of the 2 year dues option, fewer dues were collected and convention expenses for 2011 account for most of the disbursements. Steve presented the option of a lesser Surety Bond at a savings for the club but board members felt that it should be left as it is at \$25,000 coverage for \$187 per year.

Secretary's Report: Chris Bartlett reported a membership of 126 which includes several returning members. There was a loss of 8 members and addition of 7 new memberships. All new members receive a welcome letter, a packet containing a newsletter, and a Royal Bayreuth porcelain plaque. Convention attendees number 44. The club will continue to offer a

two year dues option for \$55 or \$30 for one year. Please notify Chris of any e-mail or mailing address changes in order to keep our roster up to date.

Auction Chairman Report: Steve reported the acquiring of a collection of 535 Royal Bayreuth pieces that were given to the club by Doug and Georgeann Wenger. Fifty of the pieces will be selected for a silent auction which will end Saturday afternoon. It was recommended that the club reimburse Alvin and Roberta Cappel for their expenses of gas and packing materials during their trip to Florida to pick up the collection. Request approved. Ideas will be gathered on how to sell some of the other pieces, including possibly offering some pieces on the club website, or use of eBay.

There is a large live auction Friday night with a number of very nice pieces, some with absentee bids. Rollie Rosenboom is unable to attend as auctioneer this year but a club member recommended a near-by auctioneer who has agreed to assist the club at no fee. It was suggested that he be given an honorarium of \$100 which the board approved.

Convention fees: It was recommended that the convention fee be raised to \$15 per person instead of the current \$20 per membership. This will generate a little more income to help cover convention expenses. Motion approved by the Board.

Publicity: Judy Stockwell announced that she had sent out 38 press releases about the convention to antique related publications and 39 to antique stores in the Pittsburgh area. Please send her any copies of the articles that are noticed for her records. Judy also reported on her contacts with other collector clubs with similar interests on the possibility of combining for a convention in order to meet larger hotel requirements and expenses.

Convention Programs: It was recommended that the responsibility for convention programs be assigned to the Vice President with abundant help from the board as the President deals with the convention site negotiations and details.

Convention Sites for 2013 and 2014: Comparisons of various mid west sites presented by board members were discussed and narrowed to three possibilities to be presented to the club for a membership vote. The three sites selected were: Dearborn Michigan, Indianapolis North, and Naperville, Illinois.

Nominating Committee: Jim Lapp reported that no candidate has come forth for the position of President but Karen Church has accepted the position of Vice President and Harriet Lavine has agreed to be a Board Member as Carol Edwards is unable to return for a second term.

## Pittsburgh Convention 2012 Auction Report

The 2012 auction was acknowledged by most attendees as one of the better auctions the RBCC has offered in recent years. Of the 141 pieces in the auction 100 pieces met the consignor's reserve and moved on to new owners. The actual dollars paid to the 11 consignors totaled \$30,480. This year's auction was our first auction without longtime Club Auctioneer, Rollie Rosenboom (who was unable to make it to the convention). However, we hope Rollie will again join us in Dearborn, Michigan for next year's auction. Wib Beachy bailed us out this year by obtaining the help of a fine local auctioneer, Brian Carey.

As most members are aware, Doug Wenger, a long time Club member and Royal Bayreuth collector, donated a substantial part of his collection (535 pieces) to the RBCC. In addition to the Friday night auction at the convention, we listed 50 pieces from Doug's collection in a silent auction that was held Saturday afternoon. Forty six of the fifty pieces sold adding \$2,615 to the Club's treasury.

## New Silent Auction Rules

1. Bidders must be current club members.
2. Auction pieces will be pictured and described in the current newsletter and in this list. An email will be sent to all club members who have an email address on file with the Club Secretary.
3. U.S. mail and email bids are accepted but must be received by the Auction Chair prior to the close of auction date.
4. All auction items are offered on an "as is" basis. Any damage or issues with any specific piece will be noted in the auction description. If something in the description is missed, the Auction Chair will void the piece.
5. The Auction Chair has final approval of all pieces in the auction.
6. In the event of a dispute, the judgment of the Auction Chair is final.
7. There are no buyer's premiums for items in the auction.
8. A minimum bid price will be established for each piece in the auction.
9. Bidders should submit their maximum bids to the Auction Chair before the closing date.
10. Minimum bid increments will be \$5 when the auction bid is under \$100 and \$10 when the auction bid is over \$100. (For example, if the starting bid on a specific piece is \$25 and member A sends in a max bid of \$50 and member B sends in a max bid of \$100 and the bid increments are \$5, then member B would win the piece at \$55).
11. High bidder agrees to pay the winning bid price and the cost of insuring and shipping the winning piece(s) unless alternate arrangements have been made. Auction Chair will notify winner of the total cost within one week after the close of the auction. Payments by check should be made out to "RBCC"
12. All auction sales are final.

# Royal Bayreuth Dutch Pieces

It was obvious that two of our members had done quite a lot of research when they were able to introduce themselves using their Dutch names, "Karen" and "Roberta." That translates into English as "Karen Church" and "Roberta Cappel."

Before viewing the beautiful collection of Royal Bayreuth Dutch pieces on display, members were given some interesting facts about the Netherlands, (which means "low country.") About a quarter of the country is below sea level and is in threat of the sea. Karen & Roberta explained how the dikes helped this country hold back the sea and reclaim the land (polders) from water and how the canals, pumps and windmills were used to drain the land and keep it dry.

Because houses built on canals were taxed on their width, the buildings along these canals are tall and skinny with narrow stairways. Amsterdam loves its canals and rather than pave over any more canals to allow for more automobiles, they are city friendly to bicycles and unfriendly

to cars. There are more than 16 million bicycles in Amsterdam—almost one for every citizen. Their bikes are described as unsexy granny bikes and everyone can bike because the whole country is flat as a pancake. Our group was especially interested to learn that Amsterdam has 165 canals and 165 antique stores!

"Holland" and the "Netherlands" cannot be used interchangeably. North Holland is where the official capital, Amsterdam is located; South Holland is where The Hague, the seat of government is located. North and South Holland are two of twelve provinces which make up the Netherlands and "Dutch" refers to the people or language spoken there.

Although the national flag of the Netherlands is red, white and blue, an orange pennant, is still flown as a sign of allegiance of the Dutch people to the House of Orange. Before the 16th century in the Netherlands, carrots were white, yellow, black, purple and red; orange carrots are said to have been bred in honor of the House of Orange, who led the Dutch Revolt against Spain and later became the Dutch Royal family. (The decision is still out on whether the microscope,

telescope, pendulum clock, the mercury thermometer, or the orange carrot is the most important invention of the Dutch people.)

Santa (Kerstman) takes second place in the Netherlands to Sinterklaas. However, both of these bearded men took second and third place to Bob Golmar's collection of Santas displayed in his room.

Some of the popular tourist attractions were mentioned: The Royal Delft factory still in business after celebrating their 350th year in 2003, The Anne Frank Museum, and, even a statue of the little Dutch boy who put his finger in the dyke to save the Netherlands! And what a funny tale was told about how this statue came to be! There are tours given of the Red Light District in Amsterdam, but since orange is still the official color of the Netherlands and a sign of patriotism, one would think they would rename it the Orange Light District!

The cute little Dutch boy on our cans of Dutch Boy paint was actually a nine year old Irish American boy who lived near the artist commissioned to create the logo. Dutch traders peddling cast iron pots may have given rise

to the name “Dutch oven.” Since it wasn’t unusual to pay separately when dating in the Netherlands, we have the term, “Dutch Treat.” And, our dreaded Dutch Elm Disease was identified in 1921, by a Dutch plant pathologist. Old Dutch Cleanser’s logo features a Dutch woman in traditional cap and clogs, chasing after dirt praising the virtue of Dutch cleanliness.

The “Droste” Effect got its name from the 1904 Droste Brand Cocoa box displaying a nurse carrying a serving tray. On this serving tray was another box of cocoa powder which displayed this same image and so it kept repeating. The Droste Effect is a picture appearing within itself and this continues as long as the resolution of the picture allows. Mathematicians have an interest in the Droste effect packaging because it implies infinity! Think about this next time you notice the packaging of Land O’ Lakes Butter, Royal Baking Powder, Kellogg’s Corn Flakes with bananas, and Cracker Jacks, just to name a few.

It was surprising to learn that tulips are not native to Holland. Even more surprising was the story of the tulip becoming a status symbol, and the story of Tulip Mania, which even now refers to a speculative stock market

that rises furiously, only to crash when the bottom falls out. Tulip bulbs even became an ingredient for loaves of bread and food during World War II in the Netherlands.

Carolyn Church brought a few silver Dutch Christening Spoons from her collection to share with the club. They are sometimes called “Monkey Spoons” because of the curve at the handle on which to hang them. They were so beautiful it would be hard to refer to them as such!

Viewing the collections of RB Dutch pieces, the young Dutch people look happy despite the wooden shoes they are wearing. Apparently their feet were cool since the wooden shoes allowed the air to circulate in the summer. And, one would never know that their over sized shoes were stuffed with hay for additional warmth in the winter. Hopefully, the thick heavy woolen socks that the women knitted made them dry, itch-proof from the hay, and comfortable. Dutch art had a tradition of depicting milkmaids, the symbolic maid of Holland. So, if you wonder what is in those buckets suspended from yokes, we assume it is milk! It rains a lot in the Netherlands, and most Dutch do not go for a walk without rain gear –

if you look closely, even our Dutch girl is carrying a big red umbrella!

And, notice the “fur” hats on our Royal Bayreuth Dutch men! (Even in summer scenes.) An antique postcard depicted interesting inhabitants of a fishing fleet “wearing fur hats in summer,” so perhaps the artist understood our Dutch inhabitants better than we! Roberta used her magnifying glass to study her little Dutch pieces closely. When Karen unpacked her multitude of Dutch pieces, she had some very large pieces that showed clearly details that cannot be seen in the smaller pieces. A young couple, obviously going to church, shows the Dutch girl carrying a Bible with a cross on the front. After researching many scenes in the Dutch piers, showing the Dutch women washing baskets filled with fish, Roberta took some liberties in declaring that the Dutch women on our RB pieces are carrying picnic baskets, filled with cookies! Dutch Windmill cookies were given to members of the club who stayed to the “eind” of the presentation.



# The Wengers and the Cappels Make History for the RBCC Or, How We Spent Our Summer Vacation in 2012

Have you seen the movie, “Sleeping with the Enemy,” starring Julia Roberts? Well, Alvin and I just co-starred in “Sleeping with Royal Bayreuth,” produced by Doug Wenger from Ormond Beach, Florida. And, this is how this production evolved.

Doug Wenger and Chuck Heerhold became friends through the Royal Bayreuth Collectors Club. Doug was a member of the club from 1996 through 2003, and sold some of his items at our convention about 10 years ago. In our many discussions at Doug’s home, he shared a few stories about Chuck Heerhold, Art Ward, and Wib Beachy, but those stories will forever remain in Ormond Beach, Florida.

Doug and his wife, Georgeann, are in the process of downsizing--selling their home and moving to a somewhat smaller home about three miles from their present home in Ormond Beach, FL. After debating about whether to sell his pieces on ebay, etc., he decided to GIVE his remaining collection to our club. Having known Chuck and Sandy Heerhold for years, he let them know that he was willing to donate many Royal Bayreuth pieces to our club (at no cost to us!) He estimated about 200-250 pieces. However, the

logistics needed to be worked out so that he could get those pieces to our club. Sandy, Chuck and Alvin, who is president of the club at this time, weighed the options and Alvin decided we would drive our small RV to Florida and bring them back to Ohio. This is where the “sleeping” part comes in.

When we arrived at Doug’s home, he and his wife, Georgeann, greeted us, along with their Vizla Rosie (a Hungarian Pointer). Doug owned Vizslas even prior to his marriage to Georgeann in 1971. How sad that Royal Bayreuth didn’t ever make a figural of a Vizsla.

Doug pointed out that HE is not Hungarian, but Swiss. Alvin’s maternal grandmother was a “Wenger” and also of Swiss heritage. We found Doug so congenial, we said we wouldn’t mind finding him somewhere in our Wenger family tree!
