by Kovels on Royal Bayreuth. Someone sent in a question on a Tettau Demitasse Cup and Saucer which was blue and white with a green lion and T mark. Kovels reply was "Your cup and saucer were made by Sontag and Sohne of Tettau, Bavaria, Germany a porcelain factory that opened in Tettau in 1794. It has operated under various owners and names since then and is still in business. The mark on your cup and saucer was used by Sontag and Sons, the owners of the factory from 1887 until 1902. The factory's name became Royally Privileged Porcelain Factory Tettau in 1957. Porcelain made by the factory is known today as Royal Bayreuth. There is a club of collectors of Royal Bayreuth. Its website is RoyalBayreuth.org. Value of your cup and saucer is about \$30."

A "Featured Dealer" at Bath

April 14, 2013 marked the final date of the Winter Bath Antique Show managed by local dealer and promoter Paul Fuller. This local show is now in its 24th season and presents 50 dealers offering a variety of antiques; most exhibitors are New England area dealers who display monthly from October to mid April. This year, Paul offered a featured Guest Dealer/Collector booth for folks with a specialty to share their collections and share their expertise and interest. I was honored to be invited to hold this booth for the final show of the 2012-2013 season.

I displayed two tables of my usual stock of Victorian glass, porcelain, flow blue and majolica. The display case and the third table were both devoted to a display of Royal Bayreuth pieces from my own personal collection of nearly 40 years. I also offered mint, unused copies of Ginny Salley's original Bayreuth book that she had given me back in the early 1980s. In general, people know the Sunbonnets and children's lines and many had seen some of the common tapestry forms but many folks had no knowledge of the other Bayreuth production.

I was surprised that there was little interest in the rare figural shakers that were displayed. Even the very scarce pieces like bellringer, oyster and pearl, pansy and owl didn't create much excitement! (One local dealer/collector that I've know for years stopped to admire them.) I expect that people are so used to seeing novelty shakers at shows and shops that they perhaps did not know that these were rare and special. Many people were fascinated by the tapestry pieces, especially the variety of shoes. I showed several and no two are exactly the same. Most admired and asked about were the Christmas Cactus and Sterling Silver shoes. I explained to those who asked how the tapestry finish was obtained. Another item that gathered much interest was a complete dresser set in Christmas Cactus pattern. Several people commented that they could not imagine using something so delicate in this day and age when we have become such a "throw away" society.

The most admired items were the rare figural flower tea strainers and these generated many questions from the public and dealers doing the show. Most people had never seen porcelain strainers and thought they were only made in silver and silver plate because these are the ones most commonly seen. I explained that these were not marked with the company crest and one really has to know the forms and colorations and the impressed Deponiert mark which is sometimes found and the unglazed back. I urged the dealers to look for the small Germany and Bavaria stamps as well for further proof of production on the





strainers and other small pieces like the shakers. Most of the show dealers are generalist or folks who deal in country antiques and more primitive items; I cautioned all of them "Be sure to call me if you think you've found something good!"

A local woman brought photos on her iPhone of numerous pieces of blue and white Cornflower and the mark; most of the items carried the green single lion mark shown in Mary's books. The lady indicated she did not think her children were interested in the china and she may

have interest in selling it. I encouraged her to make a list of pieces, the sizes and condition and contact me if she decided she was going to sell these. Club members who have interest in this pattern may email me at tgaudet13@gwi.net or call me at 207-407-8004 and I will supply her with your information if she wants to sell. I talked with many of the dealers about which figurals are considered to be scarce/rare and urged them to watch for brown Santa figurals which are not usually marked. For dealers who don't deal in this type of material it is good information to have.

Happy hunting and may you find yet another great piece for your collection.
