RBCC Board of Directors Meeting

Board members in Attendance: Mary and Terry Anderson, Co-Presidents Chris Bartlett, Secretary Harriet Lavine, Director Mary McCaslin, Director Judy Stockwell, Director

Recording Secretary's report: Approved as written in December newsletter.

Treasurer's report: Steve Bartlett unavailable so report will be given at Business Meeting.

Secretary's report: Chris Bartlett reported that the club membership is now 118 with six of these being new or rejoined members. Sixteen members were lost, three have passed away and others responses included no longer interested. The current dues structure is working well so will be continued - one year for \$30 or two years for \$55.

Auction: Chris Bartlett reported on the auction for Steve. There will be the regular live auction as well as a silent auction. There are 39 absentee bids submitted for the regular auction by one member and a number of other absentee bids for the live and silent auction.

Steve is willing to serve as the Auction Chairman for another year.

Convention fees: There have been some comments concerning the increase in the convention fee, now \$15 per person instead of the usual \$20 per family. This year each person registered will be receiving a gift bag. It was suggested that the increase might be clarified at the business meeting as the money goes to convention expenses such as hospitality room, Thursday evening social and light meal before the auction.

Publicity: Judy Stockwell sent out 35 press releases to antique publications with information on the convention and membership. She requests copies of any articles found by the membership to be sent to her. *The Southeastern Antique Magazine* has requested high resolution photos for a cover and an article to be published sometime in December. Kat and Gregg Thacker will submit the photos and article.

It was also noted that an article was submitted and published in the July 2013 issue of "Today's Vintage" magazine as a Spotlight article.

As the Vice President is responsible for lining up convention programs, Karen Church arranged for two interesting programs for this convention.

Convention sites: 2014 convention will be held at the Embassy Suites in St. Charles MO next October.
Terry Anderson has researched some possible sites through visitors' bureaus and will consider the use of a Residence Inn as Embassy Suites is out of our price range with the food minimums and meeting room costs. Fall dates are somewhat limited due to conflicts with ball games. A



questionnaire is being planned for members to report their ideas and travel limits. This could be put in the December newsletter.

A comment was brought up about opening the Friday night auction to the public. The discussion brought up concerns about the tax required to be collected by some states and legal issues.

Officers: Chris Bartlett and Steve Bartlett are willing to continue serving in their respective offices of Secretary and Treasurer.

Terms are up for board members Bob Gollmar and Judy Stockwell. Jim Lapp and Jay Rublaitus are eligible for another term. Judy Breece has agreed to be a board member. Further nominations will be taken from the floor during the business meeting.

Audit committee: Bev Brumbaugh and Jerry Lavine will be auditing the treasurer books.

Banquet entertainment: Volunteers are needed for planning entertainment for the 2014 convention as Judy Stockwell and Harriet Lavine will not be doing it next year.

Use of money received from the Wenger collection: Some of the money received will be used for 5 "Golden Tickets" each worth \$100 to be applied to live auction items over \$100. Five winners will be selected by a ticket drawing, allowing one per family and are non transferable. This will hopefully encourage higher bidding from attendees.

New members: There are three new members registered for the convention. Garth Moore from Canada has rejoined and new members Larry Lubliner from Illinois and Myra and Tom Sustae from Ohio.

There are 37 paid registrations for the convention with 3 or 4 more additional expected.

RBCC Welcome Meeting

Meeting opened by Terry and Mary Anderson with the introduction of the officers, board of directors, and committee members followed by the self introduction of the attendees and their area of Royal Bayreuth collecting. New members attended were introduced: Larry Lubliner from Chicago, IL; Myra and Ashley Sustae from Findley, OH; and Garth Moore from Ontario, Canada.

Recording Secretary: minutes from 2012 meeting accepted as published in last December newsletter.

Personal phone calls were made to members not attending this year with the reasons given as too far to travel, too costly and health issues.

Web Master: Gregg Thacker was presented with an engraved glass stating "I'm hers because she deserves the finest." Not to be left out, Kat Thacker was presented with a similar engraved glass.

Gregg reported that the club web site is going strong with 174,000 hits within the last 12 months, many coming from a Google search as well as from Facebook. Interest in the silent and live auctions brought 851 hits and membership 300 hits. There were 72 countries looking at the site. The cost of \$125 per year for the domain site remains the same. Gregg maintains monthly updates and sends out e-mail blasts to members on a regular basis, with more messages closer to convention time.

The Facebook site is being hosted by Susan Szymanski, Fred James and Gregg Thacker but is a public forum and anyone can respond to questions as it would be a full time commitment for one person.

Convention entertainment: Judy Stockwell and Harriet Lavine will have the Yankee Swap and other games for this years' banquet but there is a need for others to volunteer for next year as Judy and Harriet won't be available.

Hospitality room: Kat and Gregg Thacker were recognized for all their work with providing the food and creative art work plus all the gift bag items. Janet Belcher will be keeping the room open and supplied with the help of other volunteers.

Audit committee: Bev Brumbaugh and Jerry Lavine will audit the treasurer records.

Historian: Roberta Cappel has requested another volunteer to take over maintaining the scrapbooks.

It was announced that Jerry and Vicki Fischer of WI have a RB Blue Onion pattern collection for sale which includes a number of rare pieces. Members can contact them directly. Terry Anderson also knows of two sets of 1972 Sunbonnet Babies plates that are for sale.

Auction: Terry Anderson explained the "Golden Tickets" that will be given away at the live auction. There will be a drawing of 5 raffle tickets with a value of \$100 to be used as a credit towards an auction purchase. Only one per family and non transferable. This provides an incentive to bid higher on sought after items.

Steve Bartlett announced that there are 155 items in the live auction and 60 pieces available in the silent auction which will end after 3 pm on Saturday. Rollie Rosenboom will once again be the auctioneer.

Meeting adjourned at 11:10 am The meeting was followed by the Show & Tell/Wanna-Bees program.

RBCC Annual Business Meeting

The meeting was opened by Terry Anderson with a light hearted poem "Dust if You Must" reminding us to take the time to enjoy the simple things in life.

Auction report: Steve Bartlett reported that approximately 2/3 of the auction items sold. A number of pieces came very close to meeting the reserve and are now displayed with the actual selling price so you can "Buy it Now". The silent auction is also underway and will close in segments after 3PM today.

Treasurer report by Steve Bartlett: The checkbook balance as of September 16, 2013 is \$13,655.37.

More than \$3000 has been brought in through the internet auction.

Recording Secretary: report accepted as published in the December 2012 newsletter

Secretary report: Chris Bartlett reported the club membership is 118 with 6 new members. The dues structure will remain the same, \$30 for one year & \$55 for two years. Please inform Chris of any change of address or e-mail to keep the roster current. There are 40 attendees at the convention.

Publicity: Judy Stockwell sent out press releases to antique publications with convention information and would like any noticed articles be sent to her

Nominating committee: Jay Rublaitus will accept a second term on the board of directors and Judy Breece has accepted a position on the board. Jim Lapp will be contacted about serving a second term.

Audit committee: Bev Brumbaugh reported that the checkbook account is accurate

Future Conventions: 2014 convention will be held at the Embassy Suites Hotel on October 16-19 in St. Charles, MO. Suggestions are needed for future sites. Some ideas being researched are: Cleveland, Ohio; Kalamazoo, MI; and Buffalo, NY. There will also consideration of the use of a Residence Inn with no food minimum and a Saturday dinner at a local restaurant.

An in-depth survey will be developed for members to submit comments and ideas.

Convention Auction Results

The RB members who attended the Convention in Dearborn responded well to the challenge from our auctioneer Rollie Rosenboom to bid early and often. Approximately 85% of the 155 items listed in the auction sold, bringing in over \$23,000 in sales to the consignors. Of the total resulting from the auction, \$2,580 came from 28 items out of the Wenger collection. These dollars go directly to the treasury and help offset expenses incurred by the Club.



As an incentive to the members who attended the Convention, the Board had approved \$500 in "Golden Tickets." Five lucky members had their names drawn from a random raffle before the start of the auction and each won \$100 in Golden Tickets. The winners were: Judy Breece, Bev Brumbaugh, Alvin Cappel, Sandy Heerhold and Judy Stockwell. The result was that each lucky winner was able to deduct \$100 from his/her live auction purchases at the convention.

In addition, 42 of the 75 items in the silent auction at this year's Convention sold, bringing in another \$1,225 to the Club. The result of the Convention auctions and the three other silent auctions held each quarter during the year, helped the treasury grow year over year by more than \$3,100!



Our Well-Traveled RB

Editor's Note: In preparation for our "travel-themed" convention, I called a few club members who had mentioned that they had souvenir RB in their collections. As usual, the Cappels came through in a BIG way! Roberta and I had a most interesting conversation about the how she'd always wanted to try and find out more about their "travel" RB and this gave her the excuse to do some research on specific travel destinations during the RB production heyday! She shared this write-up with me a few days before the convention, and I thought it so interesting, she should share with our members. This was presented at the convention, along with all the souvenir examples our members brought to share. A very entertaining and enlightening experience for us all. Thanks Roberta!

So many times I have thought, "If only this piece of Royal Bayreuth could talk." I have started a bit of "Royal Bayreuth Genealogy" on our RB pieces, which we assume were souvenirs. The only pieces of RB that can talk to us are (1) those that have a wonderful note tucked inside giving us the history or (2) A souvenir piece that was purchased and kept as a reminder of a person, place or event. That piece speaks for itself and can tell us in what town, state, or country it was purchased, or even the date it was purchased. That is where our Royal Bayreuth Genealogy begins.

Ohio Demitasse Tomato Cup: Cedar Point. Ohio's Cedar Point opened in 1870. It is the second-oldest operating amusement park in the United States. (Lake Compounce in Bristol, CT is the oldest). Cedar Point features a world-record 72 rides, including 16 roller coasters making it the park tied with Canada's Wonderland for the second-



most roller coasters in the world. Its newest roller coaster, GateKeeper, opened in May 2013. Cedar Point has also received the Golden Ticket Award for "Best Amusement Park in the World" from Amusement Today for the past 15 years. As of 2012, the park is the most visited seasonal amusement park in the United States with an estimated 3.22 million visitors in 2012. We will never know why this tomato cup was purchased in the 1900's—perhaps to remember their first roller coaster ride!

Pennsylvania Elk Salt: "Waldemeer, Erie." Waldameer, PA (some antique postcards spell it Waldemeer) "Waldameer's origins began in the late 1800's as Hoffman's Grove, an Erie area popular picnic spot overlooking the lake. This serene destination caught the attention of the Erie Electric Motor Co., the city's main trolley company. They leased Hoffman's Grove and renamed the land Waldameer, German for "woods by the sea" - in 1896 Waldameer Park was born. A \$1000 dance hall and carousel were added, three roller coasters were built. Prohibition in 1919 caused Waldemeer to close one of its most popular attractions, the Hofbrau German Beer Garden complete with singing waiters. This seems like an appropriate souvenir from a place where elk roamed this "woods by the sea."

Boston, Massachusetts Tomato Cracker Jar (Or is it a Bean Pot?): "The Boston Food Fair 1908." Information taken from excepts from an article in the Cambridge Tribune, May 9, 1908: The original Boston Food Fair, for 1908, is to be held in the Park Square 'coliseum' for five weeks, from September 29, to October 31. 1908. It includes an Arts Exposition and will be conducted by the Boston Retail Grocers' Association. Boston previously conducted six very successful fairs in Boston at a different location. The Coliseum was remodeled for the grand opening as an exposition building and "no expense will be spared to make it ideal in every way. In architectural beauty and interior decoration, it will have no rival ... crowds ... will flock to it as a temple... to participate in the day and evening's sightseeing and amusements. The harmony of color and decorations, including the exhibition booths will be the highlight of a very definite architectural plan, more elaborate in its scope than ever before attempted." The management was eager to grasp the opportunity to hold the food fair in the Park Square Coliseum because of its subway entrances and the fact that it was in the heart of the shopping district. John Philip Sousa composed a march for the Food Fair "The Fairest of the Fair" and dedicated it to the BRGA (Boston Retail Grocers' Association.) It's said that the memory of a pretty girl Sousa had seen at a previous fair inspired this composition which is more melodic and less military in style than most of his marches. The price of admission to the food fair was 25 cents. Wonder how much this cracker jar cost?

Kansas City, Missouri Cup and Saucer: Emery, Bird, Thayer Company, Dolls' Tea Party 1913
Kansas City. The Emery, Bird,
Thayer department store in Kansas
City, Mo was built in 1863 (during the Civil War) and was located near the river landing. This was one of those stores that catered to people stocking up with supplies to settle the

western territories. The store grew with the city and became the first full lined department store in the city. In the 1890's their main store, built to look like a department store in Paris, was built downtown on 11th street and encompassed the entire block. The store had a large mezzanine that housed an elaborate tea room. In the early 1900's they began sponsoring an annual tea party for children (presumably little girls) and their dolls. Young daughters of wealthy businessmen and professionals attended elaborate tea parties and each little girl attending the tea party, left with a version of our Happy Meal Toy, a little cup and saucer. Not only Royal Bayreuth produced cups and saucers for these tea parties. I found a miniature Erphila tea party cup and saucer with graffiti scratched through orange paint indicating the name of the department store. The Emery, Bird, Thayer department store closed its doors in 1968 when it was 105 years old. But we have some little girl's cup and saucer as a remembrance of her tea party at that store.

Highland, New Jersey Long Tomato Celery Bowl: "Highland, NJ." A popular beach resort, Highland Beach had many different attractions that were built in the Victorian style of architecture. William Sandlass had traveled to Cuba and brought back a considerable amount of bamboo. This bamboo was used to construct the Bamboo Gardens, as well as the Bamboo Bar. There was an outdoor theater called an Airdrome. These were popular around World War I. The Basket Pavilion (a dance hall), a Merry Go Round, bar and storefronts existed around 1910. Also on the property were private cottages. Sandlass leased the land to families who built cottages that were used each summer. Cabanas were constructed on the river side of the peninsula.

The Sandlass family lived above the Bamboo Bar which was originally located between the railroad track and the roadway. It remained there until the Hurricane on September 21, 1938 caused considerable damage. Storms were a continual issue for the entire time Highland Beach served as a resort.

Major construction occurred from the 1880s through 1900. It included hotels, cottages, rooming houses, and private homes. A pier was built extending well into the bay to accommodate steamboats from New York City. Atlantic Highlands became a haven for bootleggers during Prohibition. Steamer service was the most important transport. In the 1890s, rail service came to Atlantic Highlands. This opened up Highlands and points south to vacationers. The 1920's saw 26 passenger trains daily passing through the Borough. The Central Railroad of New Jersey built a major pier at the end of First Avenue. Several trains at a time could continue to the end of the pier to offload steamboat passengers. From the 1910's through the 1940's, the steamers "Sandy Hook" and the "Monmouth" navigated the waters bringing businessmen and vacationers to Atlantic Highlands. Can't imagine someone packing up this LARGE souvenir.

Aberystwyth, Mid Wales Tomato/
Pumpkin Teapot "A Present
from Aberystwyth." Aberystwyth
(pronounce aber ist' with) is an
isolated little town (population in 2001
of about 16,000) on the west coast
of Mid Wales, generally regarded as
the capital of Mid Wales. Since the
late 19th century, Aberystwyth has
also been a major Welsh educational
center, with the establishment of
a university college there in 1872
(Students number about 10,400). It

was spelled Aberystwith in the 18th and 19th century, but changed to Aberystwyth in 1890. Although the town is relatively modern, it contains a number of historic buildings, including the remains of the Aberystwyth castle and the Old College of Aberystwyth University nearby. It didn't seem likely that university students would purchase a little teapot, so I wondered what was in Aberystwyth that would entice someone to purchase "a present from Aberystwyth." A "National Eisteddfod (I stead' fod or food) is a competitive festival of music and poetry. It is held every year in a different location in Wales and it turns out that Aberystwyth hosted the National Eisteddfod in 1865, 1916, 1952 and 1992. The Eisteddfod is still held every year in a different location in Wales and it is a great honor to be awarded the crown or chair for poetry. It is held for one week each year with 150,000 visitors, some of them camp there for the entire week. There were/are many food/trade stands. We believe our tomato teapot was purchased at one of the trade stands in 1916 as a souvenir.

Belfast, Ireland Strawberry Creamer "A Present From Belfast."

Belfast is the capital and largest city of Northern Ireland. In 1911, Belfast enjoyed the greatest boom in its history. Linen mills and shipyards were so successful that Belfast was unlike any other city in Ireland; it was the largest city in Ireland in 1911. In the early 20th century it was the biggest and most productive shipyard in the world. The city's main shipbuilders built the RMS Titanic. Belfast means "mouth of the sandy ford," -- there was no well known beach or resort there! I'm not sure why this creamer was a present purchased in Belfast. But, unlike the Titanic, it has survived over 100 years!

Chichester, England Double
Tomato Creamer: "A Present from
Chichester." Chichester (pronounce
chi chi' ster) is a cathedral city in West
Sussex, in South-East England known
for its superb medieval cathedral, the
only English cathedral visible from
the sea. The city was founded by the
Romans at a point where two of their
major roads crossed – a point marked
by a lovely 16th century buttercross.

The buttercross was built so that the poor people would have somewhere to sell their butter, milk, eggs and fresh produce, and as a meeting point. I can only guess that our strawberry creamer was perhaps sold with fresh strawberries under the buttercross. (There is also a Chichester, New Hampshire, but there was no attraction there, and the population decreased through the early part of the 1900's, so that only 15 men were called to serve in WWI. I can't imagine this was a town that would sell a sweet little strawberry creamer as a souvenir!)

Morecambe, England Double Tomato Creamer "A Present from

Morecambe." Morecambe (pronounce more' come) is a town on Morecambe Bay in Lancashire, England. As many of our signed souvenir pieces are from the seashore, this town grew in the late nineteenth and early twentieth centuries as a popular thriving seaside resort. It had more visitors from Yorkshire and Scotland (due to its railway connection). I assume this little strawberry creamer came from the seaside resort.

A Guest Appearance by Schafer & Vater

What do a pink tea set with comical faces, a doctor holding a giant hypodermic needle, a nun with a wine bottle, a zeppelin, a girl in a turtle shell and a clown with a pig have in common? The answer is they are all porcelain items made by Schafer & Vater and all are bottles except for the tea set and the girl in the shell. S&V began making high quality hard paste porcelain in 1890 at Volksted Rudolstad, Thruinga, Germany. They were neighbors to the Royal Bayreuth factory in Tettau. Unfortunately when the border lines were drawn at the end of World War II they found themselves in the Russian Zone. The firm closed in 1962. Bobby Jo and I picked S&V as our subject after being asked to present a program during our recent convention. We felt that the high quality of their product as well as the subjects they produced would be of special interest to club members, some of whom collect S&V.

We believe collectors collect! Bobby Jo opened our presentation with a question. Offering a prize for the largest number of collections in



addition to RB, she asked those with 10 or more collections to raise their hands. A sea of hands went up. She raised the ante, more than 20, 30, 40, 50 and we still had hands in the air. The prize went to Mary and Terry Anderson with 64 separate collections. Cub members were then asked to stand and describe the most unusual item they collected. Later Roberta Cappel said that she felt she had attended a meeting of "Collectors Anonymous."

Next we moved to the subject

of S&V. In addition to the items we had brought from our collection, the Andersons and Heerholds graciously furnished examples of their own S&V. These efforts were coordinated so there were no duplicates. A discussion about the display followed. The owners pointing out certain obvious features as well some that were hidden. For example, two of the large bottles we brought also contained music boxes. At the close of the presentation club members were invited to come forward for a closer "look" at individual pieces.

This may have been the largest display of rare S&V porcelain that has been brought together in one place in recent times. All who see S&V agree that it was designed to put a smile on your face.
