

We are less than two months away from the 2014 convention in St. Charles MO. Our Club Auction has about 145 items this year. Half of the items are from the Wenger collection, the balance have been generously consigned by Club members.

Again, we have a wide assortment of figural, scenic, tapestry and others for the beginning collector as well as the long-time collector who is trying to find that one last piece or two that completes their collection. At this point for this year's auction, I will consider adding only those pieces that are extremely unusual or rare.

Please go to the Club's website (www.royabayreuth.org) to view pictures of the items in the auction. The listing as of this printing is included below. We are pleased that Rollie and Ruth Rosenboom will once again be conducting the live auction (Rollie on the gavel and Ruth on the adding machine). With Rollie leading the bidding, a fun time is guaranteed for all who attend. For several years now we have had members who have been unable to attend the convention bid successfully through an absentee bid process.

There are a couple of ways to enter your bid if you can't join us for the auction. You can have a member who is attending bid for you, or you can have a member of the auction committee handle your bidding. If you want the auction committee to bid, you need to have your maximum bid to me in writing by Sunday, October 12.

You can send your bids to my home address or by email. If you are the high bidder on any item(s), you agree to pay any shipping, insurance and packing fee, in addition to the cost of your winning bid. I will notify you of the exact costs within one to two weeks after the close of the auction.

The significant benefit to Club members is THERE IS NO BUYER'S PREMIUM OR BUYER/SELLER FEES for items consigned or purchased through the Club auction. We always attempt to accurately describe each piece in our auctions. If any damage is found before a piece is auctioned that was not previously described, we will either pull the piece or not accept any absentee bidders who are not fully aware of the damage.

The Club offers no warranties and all items are sold as is with no returns. We hope to see you in St. Charles but if you can't make it, please send in your absentee bids. If you are thinking about downsizing or divesting your Royal Bayreuth collection, please consider the Club auction as a viable option. We have had members who have consigned pieces over a 2-3 year period. This has given them the opportunity to enjoy their RB a bit longer and the Club to have some great RB pieces in the auction.
