Alvin wore SO many hats in service to the RBCC. He was a past President, board member (MANY times over) as well as an Auction Chair and current Treasurer (a duty shared by his loving wife). Both he and Roberta are founding members, who worked tirelessly for our club these past 25 years. Their creatively-themed hospitality rooms and amazing banquet entertainment at our conventions shall never be forgotten!

Alvin's humor, charm and willingness to help everyone were always appreciated and shall be greatly missed.

From Our President

Hello again to all, Well, Punxsutawney Phil did not see his shadow! That means for those of us who were not smart enough to go south for the winter we're supposed to have an early spring. I hope he's right. Even though this winter has not been as brutal as some we've had, it has had its moments.

Planning is well underway for this year's Convention. As reported in the last newsletter, the 2019 Club Convention will be held at the Drury Inn on Settlers Ridge outside Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania from Thursday, September 12 thru Saturday, September 14. The accommodations will be rooms, not suites, at the group rate of \$120 per night. Reservations can be made online by going to www. druryhotels.com or by phoning 1-800-325-0720 and referring to the Group number 2355885.

Simply indicate your days of arrival and departure. If you have special needs, make that known as well. There should be no problem. If there is, contact me and I will try to resolve it. The cut-off date for reservations is Monday, August 12, 2019.

There will be only one excursion during the Convention. It will be a group tour of Fallingwater on Saturday afternoon. Fallingwater, which is the Kaufmann family summer home compound designed by Frank Lloyd Wright in the Laurel Highlands, is about 1 hour and 15 minutes away. If you've never been there before (and even if you have), Fallingwater is an experience you'll never forget. It is the premier attraction southwestern Pennsylvania has to offer — particularly at that time of year. There will be a bus chartered for this excursion.

Because of feedback received from some of you, Friday afternoon will not feature an excursion but rather an in-depth presentation on a subject which should be of major interest to the true Royal Bayreuth collector. Contrary to what we've been led to believe, Royal Bayreuth returned albeit under different marks after World War I and continued until the outbreak of World War II — a 20-year period I've dubbed the Lost Years. The style was primarily but not exclusively Art Deco and featured pieces designed by the factory's art department. It started with the Imperial Ware mentioned briefly in Mary's Book II. It was tailored for the domestic market in Germany as opposed to foreign export. I urge all Club members to attend this year's Convention if you want to learn how little you actually know about the Tettau factory and its continued production of Royal Bayreuth as well as successor wares. You will not be disappointed!

While there will be a Club Auction again this year, its offerings will be more limited than last year's Auction. About 100 pieces will be auctioned, with each Lot to be assessed the same \$10 handling fee whether or not that Lot sells. The deadline for consignment of pieces to the Auction will be earlier — May 30, 2019. Contact me or Jim Lapp/ Susan Szymanski, who have graciously agreed to help me with this year's Auction.

In addition to this year's Auction, there will be tables within the same room for those members bringing pieces to sell outside of the Auction, since the accommodations are rooms, not suites. A \$25 fee will be charged for each table a member wishes to reserve.

A Chinese Auction will also take place for certain pieces or lots donated to the club on separate tables, running from Friday morning thru Saturday night.

I hope Spring has sprung in your town! It has been a difficult Winter in so many ways that I am very happy to see Spring return.


As we do each March, we reset the user name and password required to access member data on our website. Please make a note of the new information below for future reference

RBCC Supports Member Sales

Whether downsizing, or trying to handle an inherited collection of Royal Bayreuth, the RBCC can be a valuable resource to help sell your collection. We developed this article for people who suddenly find themselves with a lot of RB to sell and know little about it, but there may be some tips for experienced collectors too....

The first step is to make a list. This can be a lot of work for large collections packed away in multiple boxes - but is really necessary to support sales of RB in any manner. The list should be on a computer (software doesn't matter) since hand written lists are difficult to work with. It is best if you can find the piece in one of the recognized RB books (a list of books is here: www.royalbayreuth.org/links.html) and use that description and reference in your list. Alternatively, you can watch eBay and online sales to help identify your pieces correctly. It is important to have color, and height/diameter noted to distinguish between items (i.e. is it a creamer, milk, water, or lemonade pitcher?; -). It is also important to note any damage if possible. A photo of each piece is nice, but not mandatory.

The price lists from published books are out of date. The best source of current pricing is eBay (allowing for expenses) or auction results (which can be hard to obtain). Working with club members and/or attending the club convention provides a wealth of information regarding pricing. Our next convention will be held in Pittsburgh PA in September 2019.

Rarity - recently there have been several large collections sold (and more on the horizon) - making some "rare" pieces or patterns slightly less rare. But there can always be some hidden gems. It is a good idea to have your collection/list reviewed by someone very familiar with RB - ideally someone from the club. They can point out the exceptional pieces as well as common (or non RB) items. This will help you decide how to sell them. The club does not handle dinnerware, it is best to sell more utilitarian plates & cups via http://www.replacements.com/china/ROB.htm

Sales Channels - there are several ways to sell RB - below are some thought starters:

- a) Sell via the club's annual convention auction in September. You must be a club member, and there is a fee & process which you should discuss with the Auction Chair or club President
- Attend convention and sell pieces directly to members during convention. This is a relatively easy way to sell RB with low fees and less shipping – but only occurs once a year. Simply join the club and

- bring your pieces to convention to sell. There is no fee to sell this way.
- c) Sell directly to club members via our newsletter and website. Join the club and we can work with you to tune-up your list and place it on our website. Then we will share the list with all RBCC members in regular email announcements and in the newsletters. There are currently several ongoing sales (shown elsewhere in this newsletter) that you can look at for examples.
- d) Sell online (i.e. eBay) very tedious to do listings and shipping but can yield some good results....
- e) Work with a professional auction house to sell all pieces in one (or more) sales. We have two auctioneers in our club who are well versed in RB sales:

f) A combination of above. By selling through the club you will gain valuable information about your pieces and help with your list to support sales by other channels.

If you do sell an inherited collection by the club, we enjoy sharing a little background about the collector in the newsletter! Things like; What was her/his first piece of RB? Where did he/she buy pieces? How did she/he display the pieces? Did he/she use the pieces on occasion? Photos of the collector and collection are always appreciated!

There are fees when selling in the annual club auction, but no other fees to club members selling pieces as noted above. If you require a lot of help preparing your list we would appreciate 10% of net proceeds being returned to the club to help with expenses. It is a best practice that club members helping prepare such sales NOT negotiate purchases or accept pieces until after the sale has been made available to members.

A good next step would be to attend a club convention or discuss sale of your collection with a Gregg Thacker (Editor@Royalbayreuth.org) or our Club President (Wib Beachy beachyispeachy@yahoo.com). Then prepare your list and start selling!
