A Tale of Two 'Roos

An odd coincidence occurred on December 5th of this year. Two auctions, one in the UK and one in NY, one at 5 a.m. & one at 5 p.m., both offering Kangaroos!

I was sent notifications of two different auctions on Live Auction, each offering Royal Bayreuth Kangaroo creamers. Both looked like nice pieces at first glance, so I decided to try my luck at them!

The first sale was being held at Kingham & Orme, which is in Evesham in the UK. The description read: A Royal Bayreuth porcelain novelty creamer jug, in the form of a kangaroo, printed mark, 12.5 cm high. The glaze color was mostly medium

brown with a bit of gray, and upon closer inspection from the photos, it looked a bit scuffed up on both sides. I considered just how much the added expenses of out-of-the-country bidding (buyers premium, Vat tax, packing & shipping overseas). There were a couple of other RB lots that also looked good, as well as some Schafer & Vader items and a large lot of pink pigs.

Of course with the time difference, it started at 5 a.m., ugh. The bidding was over pretty quickly

(10 bids) and the "jug" went for £150 (\$202.13) This didn't include the extra fees, but still seemed pretty cheap for a 'Roo, despite less than perfect color!

Several rarer RB lots included a Mouse water and a Rabbit creamer (strangely offered as a pair with a monk

creamer). Both were beautiful, and both went out of my price range, but it was fun to bid anyway.

The second auction started at 5 p.m. at George Cole Auctions in Red Hook, NY. Lot #164 was listed as a Royal Bayreuth Kangaroo

Creamer 4.75" EST \$200-300. The color was mostly gray and light tan, and the piece looked much better as far as no glaze loss. There were only 4 bids, and it sold for \$350 (before the fees). Again, a bargain for any 'Roo hunters out there.

As much as we're all missing real live auctions and real antiquing in shops these days, it's still a bit of a rush bidding online. And seeing special RB being offered just adds to the fun. Happy hunting out there in virtual antiquing land!

Show & Tell

Here are eight interesting pieces for Show & Tell....





First is the large blue and white (with gold accents) chocolate pot featuring a harbor scene with sailing ships. It has the Tettau mark. I have not seen this piece before.





Next is the Red Crow with brown beak creamer. It is rarely seen.



Third is the variant poppy candleholder -- apricot in color with lavender and gold highlights. It is the first of its type I've ever encountered.



Two shoes are the fourth and fifth pieces. While I'm not a shoe collector, these were must pick-ups -- the white buck with early mark men's shoe and the cactus flower ladies' shoe. The latter is also a first for me!



The remaining three pieces are two demi-cup and saucer sets with the Tettau mark, which have the same motif of a plant with gold berries but different primary colors of light blue versus pink.



And finally a later floral pink cup and saucer with the Royal Bayreuth mark used mainly for exports to Great Britain.

The "Lost Years" - New Discoveries!

Imagine, if you can, the world 100 years ago. World War I had ended. Nationalist patriotic fervor amid various artistic movements -- Secessionist, Jugendstil, Art Nouveau, Neo-Classical, and Art Deco -- was sweeping throughout the countries involved in that War. With the economic boom of the 1920s, nations experienced a renaissance, with competition the order of the day for all endeavors, including the fine arts. Rather than being just a trade, porcelain manufacture became a specialized way to express and celebrate art.

Kunst Abteilung or Art Department pieces began appearing for the factories in Germany, including Tettau. The so-called "Lost Years" of 1919 thru 1939 produced some of finest works ever made by man. Fortunately, despite World War II, many of these pieces have survived. The creative genius shown by the modelers and finishers of these pieces is truly remarkable. For proof of this, a photograph of the Hutschenreuther large scarab or beetle covered box I've acquired, taken by Susan Szymanski, is included with this article.





Since my presentation on the Lost Years at the Club's last Convention in Pittsburgh, I have continued to seek out pieces from that period as well as any forerunners to that period. I have been lucky enough to add to what I had at the Convention. With this article photographs of those additions, also taken by Susan,

appear for you to not only see but appreciate.

What better way to symbolize the rebirth of patriotic fervor in Germany was there than to manufacture pieces with the Iron Cross and/or the Imperial Eagle. In addition to the covered box I displayed at the Convention, I now have a vase featuring the Iron Cross and a spectacular raised cup and saucer adorned with both the Iron Cross and the Imperial Eagle. The Iron Cross is worked into the top of the cup's handle (very similarly to the working of the Star of David into the finial of the covered urn shown at the Convention), while turquoise enameled dots highlight the Eagle in two areas. All three pieces feature the Bayern mark that was reserved for Germany's domestic market after World War I. I also have acquired a stunning Fraureuth gold and cobalt blue demitasse cup and saucer, both of which sport the Iron Cross very cleverly.

The same Bayern mark on my three Tettau patriotic pieces was stamped on two demitasse cup and saucers I now have. One is very basic in its shape and white color, but has elegant (yet simple)









gold accents; the other has a floral design. They are successors to seven earlier sets with the Tettau mark which I have as well.

Collectively, these sets are representative of the Jugendstil, Art Nouveau and Art Deco movements mentioned above in their shapes, decorations and colors. To represent the first or Secessionist movement I have another candlestick with an abstract design and bright colors similar to but different from the candlestick I exhibited for this movement at the Convention.

None of the pieces mentioned so far are Kunst Abteilung pieces. Those pieces have the express Kunst Abteilung mark. In this newsletter two are shown and will be discussed. They are among the proverbial crown jewels of my collection.

The first is an Art Nouveau woman with grapes vase featuring green, black and gold colors against a white background. It is one of the original 30 so-called Imperial Line pieces shown in the two color plates found on Page 16 of Mary's Book II, which initially appeared in the German book entitled "Tettau". At nearly 10 inches in height, it is larger in size than one would expect from its depiction at the bottom left of the one color plate.



The second has to be seen to be believed. It is a massive but magnificent figural piece of what is believed to be a Greek goddess, perhaps Cybele, standing in front of an architectural planter, with a lion at her feet. It is nearly 13 inches high, 10.5 inches long, and 9 inches wide.

The colors are subtle but striking, the mold details are incredible, and the finish while glossy enhances rather than diminishes the overall look. Describing this Neo-Classical piece as museum caliber does not do it justice.

I hope you enjoy viewing these pieces as much as I enjoy having them, even though that's not possible. The hunt for other Imperial Line or Kunst Abteilung pieces will continue for me for as long as the Good Lord gives me breath. I already have another original Imperial Line piece and a further Kunst Abteilung piece featuring a scarab or beetle on top of an oval covered box in the fold. They will be included in the next Newsletter. I still have 19 more to go for the original Imperial Line and who knows how many more for those Kunst Abteilung pieces produced after the original Imperial Line. What a legacy the Tettau Factory has left us to pursue!
