From Our President

Hello Fellow RBCC Members,

Hopefully, you're staying warm this Winter Season and are not yet in any doldrums. While it has been cold at times to start the season, it also has been unusually warm at other times. I've already begun the countdown to Spring, whether or not Punxsutawney Phil, our celebrity groundhog, agrees with me in doing so.

December was a rough month for my wife and me. After avoiding Covid for over three years, we had our good fortune end after visiting our second granddaughter for several hours at our son's home near Harrisburg. Unknown to us and her parents, she had contracted the trifecta of Covid, RSV, and the flu, all of which landed her in the hospital for nearly two weeks after we returned home. Linda and I contracted only the Covid from her, but that was bad enough, given our age and health conditions.

Christmas came and went without any real celebration by us, as we convalesced at home. I'm happy to report we're now back to normal and very glad that experience is behind us.

As you know from Gregg and Kat's email blast, December also was rough with the passing of Mary McCaslin, who along with Bob was instrumental in the club's founding, later becoming its Secretary. She spearheaded the writing and publishing of the two reference books primarily used by those who collect Royal Bayreuth. My full remembrance of her appears later in this Issue.

In transitioning from 2023 to 2024, I was able to add a number of pieces to my collection, as you will see. They include a further Patriotic cup and saucer with a bold blue background, three more Kunst Abteilung pieces, a striking Heliosine vase, several Santa Claus and Devil vessels, another discovery item (Lady Clown pipe rest), the full-bodied Lady in Flowing Gown vase, and other oddities if not rarities. The Santa Claus and Devil pieces largely came from a culling of excess inventory by the Toby Museum outside Chicago. Coming on the heels of Woody's auction of Mary's collection, because of their number, they attracted substantially lower amounts than their true worth. I doubt that 2024 will see the number of great offerings 2023 had for Royal Bayreuth.

Patriotic and Kunst Abteilung Additions

Leading off this Issue is another Patriotic cup and saucer set with a bold blue background. With the Iron Cross and gold wreath as well as banding, this set is my favorite one of the series.



Next are three more Kunst Abteilung or Art Department pieces. Two are of the original Imperial Line – the decorative vase and the circular covered box. Note their similarity in floral design and colors.

The third piece is a later scenic landscape covered box. All have the same early mark of the Art Department of the Tettau Factory.







Show and Tell

As mentioned in My Message, there was a large culling of excess inventory by the Toby Museum outside Chicago and the listing of those pieces on eBay to close out 2023. They included both the Santa Claus and Devil series. Most of the larger pieces of the Santa Claus series in all three color variations plus the so-called breakfast creamer (not the same one in Mary's collection) are shown in the one group photograph.

The Devil series was the complete water, milk pitcher, and creamer set in the red coloration. In addition, there was a back Devil creamer, as shown. It has the early blue mark.

Next is a larger Heliosine vase in the varied coloration for this series. Its swirled design has an Art Nouveau flavor. It has both the blue mark and attached "seal".





The Lady in Flowing Gown follows. This extremely rare piece came from the West Coast. Having the early blue mark, she joins her sister (who has a more colorful gown) in my permanent collection.





Sticking with the ladies leads to the discovery piece for this Issue – the Lady Clown pipe rest. While unmarked, the design, color and weight or "feel" of this piece are unmistakably Royal Bayreuth.



The same can be said for the Lady Golfer heartshaped trinket dish It is the second of its type I've ever encountered.



I have a fondness for the Nymph or Fairy series as well. I picked up three pieces, two of which are a matched pair and one of a different coloration. They are all shown in the group photograph below.





The Stag and Doe series is represented by the Hat Pin Holder, as pictured. It, also, is a very rare piece. I know that Delbert Highlands, if he were still alive, would want it for his collection.

Two scenic peacock pieces further appear. One is a two-hole mini-vase and the other is the hair receiver. They are the first of this series I've encountered.





The scenic Sunset pitcher and large steamship jug follow. While I have a number of other pieces for these series, the two shapes are unique. The scene on the Sunset vase is the first of its kind for me as well.







A purple luster candleholder because of its boldness in both color and glaze qualified for Inclusion in this Issue. It joins the two all green vases, misidentified as candlesticks, found in the last Issue.

Last, but not least, is the error piece: the orange painted lemon covered mustard with spoon. Error pieces by definition are uncommon.





Wannabes (Maybees)

As usual, the Wannabe category closes out my contributions to this Issue. The unmarked scenic bird series depicted by the open sugar shown is usually attributed to Royal Bayreuth. I have a number of pieces for this series because of its design and colors.

The earliest piece featured in this Issue is the unmarked blue and white cat-handled creamer believed to have made in Germany. Because of its heavier weight I do not believe it to have been made by the Tettau Factory which produced Royal Bayreuth. That does not mean



its design, however, was not used by Royal Bayreuth in creating what it did for its later cat-handled wares.

Finally, in contradistinction to one another, are two scenic hunting salt and pepper shaker sets. The one set is clearly Royal Bayreuth. Just as clearly, the other set is not. It was made in Japan. While it has similarity to the Royal Bayreuth version not shown, it is lacking in the detail, colors, and finish of Royal Bayreuth.
